





Fish Bisque,

A fish bisque is made from one cupful of cold fish minced very fine, one cup of hot milk and a cupful of any white stock. The carcass of a chicken cooked slowly will yield an excellent stock for this purpose. The seasoning consists of a teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, salt, a dash of cayenne and a tablespoonful of chopped parsley.

Put fish, seasoning and stock together in a pan. Mix one tablesponful of flour and the same quantity of butter together and stir into the fish mixture. Cook and then stir in the boiling milk, adding a tablespoonful of cracker crumbs.

Potato Apples.

Take two cupfuls of boiled potatoes mashed, and heat them. Mix the mashed potatoes with two tablespoonfuls of hot milk and shape into eight portions, forming a ball. Put one quart of tomatoes into a saucepan with a small onion sliced. Cook twenty minutes, then rub through a sieve and return to the fire to keep hot. Meanwhile boil one quart of milk in a double boiler, thicken with two tablespoonfuls each of butter and flour creamed together and stir constantly until smooth and creamy. Season the strained tomato with a teaspoonful of sugar and

pepper and salt to taste. When all ready to serve add a half teaspoonful of soda to the tomatoes and then the boiling thickened milk Stir quickly and serve at once with croutons.

Hermits.

Cream one cupful butter with one and one-half cupfuls of sugar and add one teasponful of vanilla, three well-beaten eggs and one-half teaspoonful of soda dissolved in one tablespoonfful of hot water. Mix one and one-half cupfuls of chopped nut meats with one cupful of chopped raisins, one-half cupful of currants, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one teaspoonful of cloves, one-half teaspoonful of ginger, and three cupfuls of sifted flour, then combine the two mix-

Malted Milk Fudge.

To make malted milk fudge dissolve three cupfuls of malted milk in a cupful of water, add three and one-half pounds of granulated sugar and three cupfuls of hot water. Boil until the syrup spins a substantial thread or forms into a soft ball when dropped into cold water. Beat and cool in thing a little substantial at the four the usual way and cut into squares. Veal With Almonds.


