DIVORCE CODE BILL IN HOUSE

Constitutional Convention and State Fair Approved

INVESTIGATE MINE CAVES

Long Residence in State Not Required In Case of Charge of Adultery-Insanity Included in Grounds for Divorce.

(Special Harrisburg Correspondence.) Harrisburg.-Representative Daniel. Shern, of Philadelphia, introduced in the Pennsylvania House of Represenatives a divorce code drafted as the result of the efforts of the Divorce Code Commission, of which ex-Governor Pennypacker and Walter George Smith, of Philadelphia, were members. The new bill is similar to that offered two years ago, but less strict in ceruniform with measures in other States. No length of residence in Pennsylva nia is required of those who bring suits for divorce on grounds of adultery, although under the existing laws one year's residence is necessary. Two years' residence is required in all other instances. Insanity is included as ground on which divorce may be obtained. The appointment of masters is made discretionary with the courts. Principal among the bills reported out of committee were the two measures providing for amendments to the State Constittuion. These measures provide for a commission, to be named by the Governor, to ascertain necessary charges and to regulate the holding of an election when the question of amending the Constitution

General Bernardo Reves ex-Secretary of War and a strong adherent of ex-President Diaz, was shot through the head and killed in front of the National Palace. He had been liberated by cadets from the Cavalry School. The commander of the cadets, who attempted to surrender to Madero, was executed by them.

The decision to rise was reached at a conference in the suburbs by military men, led by General Mondragon, former Minister of War under Diaz, the move being hastened by the fact that the Government had learned of the plot and placed several hundred

troops in the palace. After some street fighting, in which about 300 persons were killed, the Government succeeded in regaining partial control. President Madero led the loyal troops for a part of the time.

Among the killed were two American women and one man. The Americans, who had gone to the square to see the fight, protected other women from the mob. General Lauro Villar, post commander, was wounded in the foot and shoulder. General Garcia Pena, Minister of War, was slightly injured by a stone. President Madero had a narrow

escape from being killed. Many Americans were prominent among the spectators at the scenes of illes living in one room, chalk lines the trouble, both women and men exbeing drawn across in such a manner posing themselves dangerously.

WEBB BILL PASSES THE HOUSE

Measure, Substituted By the House For the Kenyon-Sheppard Bill, Prohibits Interstate Shipments Of Liquor Into Dry States.

Washington .- By an overwhelming vote of 240 to 65, the House passed the Webb Anti-Liquor Shipment bill, a companion measure to the Kenyon-Sheppard bill now pending in the Senate, both of which are framed to stop the transportation through interstate commerce of intoxicants from "wet" to "dry" States where the liquors are to be used in violation of the laws of "dry" States.

The bill ran a gantlet of stormy debate. It was assailed as a "filmflam" measure, as ineffective as a legal instrument to break up illicit liquor traffic and as unconstitutional. Its friends defended it as a statutory provision which will give State authorities power to seize intoxicants when satisfied the latter are to be used in violation of the prohibition laws. The supporters of the bill declared that it is framed not to prohibit the shipment of liquors for household, personal and medicinal use, but the transportation of intoxicants to "bootleggers," "blind tigers" and "speak-eastes."

"MILLIONS SQUANDERED."

Incompetence and Recklessness Charged In Reclamation Service.

Washington.-A searching Congressional inquiry into the Reclamation Service and all of its transactions and the removal from office by President Taft of Assistant Secretary of Interior Samuel Adams and Director F. H. Newell and Supervising Engineer L. C. Hill, of the Reclamation Service, pending the inquiry, are strongly recommended and urged in a sensational report, which will be presented to the House by the Committee on Expenditures in the Department of the Interior. The report charges that owing to incompetence and recklessness of the engineers of the Reclamation Service the Government faces a total loss of between \$110,000,000 and \$115,000,000.


