Farmers Busy in Every Locality—Churches Raising Funds for Many Worthy Objects—Items of Business and Pleasure that Interest.

The Bowman's silk mill, at Bowmanstown, is working to its fullest capacity, to continue all summer.

Donation day at the Day Nursery and Children's Home at Allentown netted \$288.

The State Highway Department is making preparations to improve the Easton-Bethlehem road.

Two automobiles were smashed when Howard DeLong and Lawrence North collided at Allentown.

All the Lehigh Coal & Navigation Company's mines throughout the Panther Creek Valley are working full-handed and on full time.

Carbon County Civil Court opened with a big list of important cases for trial, which will require all week to dispose of.

State officials south of the forestry lands south of Williamsport appealed to private fighters to aid them in combating forest fires that have been raging in two townships.

With a group of friends, who had come to cheer him up, standing on his threshold, Peter Knock, a Danville shoemaker, aged 58, sent a bullet into his temple and died shortly after.

Harry Woods and Hester Mayhew, both negroes, were put on trial at Lancaster to answer the charge of murdering Patrick Rooney, an octogenarian hermit-farmer, of Colerain township.

Teamsters presented a petition before the Carbon County Grand Jury asking that they recommend to the court the repairing of the State highway between Mauch Chunk and Lehigh.

Search is being made at Lebanon by direction of Dr. K. Ziegler, the German Consul at Philadelphia, for heirs of Charles Adolph Hahn, who was the victim of a railroad accident here 23 years ago.

At a session of the Wyoming conference, \$1,000,000 was pledged toward the \$20,000,000 fund for the purchase of a home in Philadelphia for Bishop Berry.

Homer Friedline, arrested for running an automobile into another car on Main street, offered the unique defense that he thought he was dead, and did not know of the collision. He was fined \$15.

Burgess Brooke, of Pottstown, is trying to discover who furnishes liquor to persons on his "flag list," and sentenced Charles Sell, who is on the list and "couldn't remember who gave him the booze," to 120 hours in the lockup.

Acting as his own detective, Mayor Walker of Altoona timed Dr. Frank Keagy and found him driving his automobile at 25 miles an hour. Instructing Chief of Police Tillard to make an information against the doctor, the Mayor issued a warning to automobilists and motorcycleists.

Mrs. John Reed, 54 years old, wife of a locomotive engineer residing at Altoona, was run down, mangled and instantly killed at Tuscarora by the Pennsylvania's special. Mrs. Reed, with her husband, was camping at that point, where they attempted to cross the tracks.

It was unofficially announced that the Northumberland County Commissioners, sitting as a Board of Tax Revision, had decided to raise the valuations of coal properties held in the county by \$10,000,000, or 40 per cent., over the previous assessment. The increase would mean an additional tax income of \$40,000,000.

Charged with horse-stealing, Edward Hoy, aged 14 years, of Philadelphia, was arrested at Conshohocken by Policeman Mason. The boy is said to have stolen a horse and buggy belonging to William Broderick, a blacksmith, of Fifty-eighth street and Lancaster avenue, Philadelphia, on Friday, and abandoned them in the outskirts of the borough.

Wilkes-Barre has lost one of its town characters. "Clint," a bull terrier, owned by H. R. Coronway, was killed recently by an auto racing on Carey avenue. The dog was an intelligent little fellow and was widely known.

Abe Buzzard, the former bandit of the Welsh Mountains, who recently served his time in the Eastern Penitentiary, has decided to make his home in Reading, instead of going to California, and his first day's work was cellar digging.

The latest adjunct to its activities calling attention to progress in this direction was the recent appearance upon the streets of a motor car washed in mud and powdered with the fine dust of various grades of colors produced between here and Baguio. It had made a new record between the summer capital and Manila.

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says: "Better weather, excellent Winter Wheat crop reports, renewed activity by farmers, resumption of operations in the flooded districts of the Central West and a more reassuring outlook in the lower Mississippi Valley are the leading favorable features of the week. Over against this must be set the increased prominence of tariff discussion, particularly as regards the textile industries in the Eastern States of the country, and the continuance of a degree of stringency in money, despite more evidences of easing, both at home and abroad.

"On balance, the situation presents a fairly favorable position, because the displacement of cold, wet weather by sunshine and warmth has made for more active retail trade at most points.

"Business failures for the week were 290, which compares with 260 in the like week of 1912. There were 21 failures in Canada.

"Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week aggregate 3,568,592 bushels, against 2,843,789 bushels this week last year."

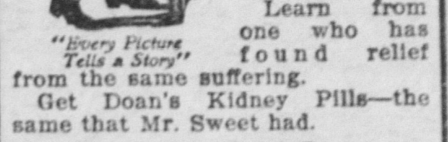
