

Cases in May Court.

Court convened on Monday morning at ten o'clock for the regular May sessions of court, and after hearing a number of motions and petitions and taking the return of the several constables of the county, calling list of jurors and noting absentees, the grand jury was called and sworn, and James K. Barnhart, cashier of the First National Bank of Bellefonte, selected as foreman, and after being charged as to their various duties, retired to the grand jury room for deliberation.

The civil list of cases was then gone over and a large number of them were continued.

The first case taken up for trial was Christ Decker vs. Samuel Decker, being an appeal from decision, and grows out of a controversy in reference to a line fence in Walker township. The township auditors were called in to the case, finding made by them, which was ignored by the defendant, and the plaintiff built the fence and brought this action to recover the expenses of erecting the division fence, the defendant relying on the fact that he had started to erect the fence but was stopped by the plaintiff. Verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$29.85, subject to the question of law.

Commonwealth vs. Elias Breon, charged with assault and battery. Prosecutor, Charles H. Bierly. Bill ignored and prosecutor to pay costs.

Commonwealth vs. Henry Haupt, charged with larceny. Prosecutor, W. H. Miller. Defendant appeared in open court. Sentence was suspended.

Harry Mease, who broke jail, plead guilty in open court, and stated that another prisoner made for him a wire key. Sentence was suspended until after the case of the accomplice can be tried.

FORCE OF GRAVITY.

It Makes You Fall Faster in Boston Than in Mexico City.

Did you know that you "drop" faster in Massachusetts than in Mexico? For instance, if you were to fall from a twenty story building in Boston you would descend a lot faster than if you fell from the same height in the City of Mexico.

The principle of this is quite simple, even if it does seem a bit startling. It is merely that as one goes toward the equator the force of gravity gets less and less and the quickness of descent of a falling body slower; and, while doubtless you would feel just as uncomfortable falling that distance in one place as in another and the results would be just as disastrous, there are times and things in which the difference is not only perceptible, but worth a notice.

In Boston if you were to fire horizontally with a rifle and your gun were sixteen feet from the ground the bullet fired would reach the ground one second after it had left the rifle. But if you were to take that same rifle to the City of Mexico and fire it off the same distance from the earth it would take one and one-half seconds to reach the ground.

So it is easy to see how when hunting in different parts of the world it is necessary to calculate time from this same shifting standard of reckoning.—New York World.

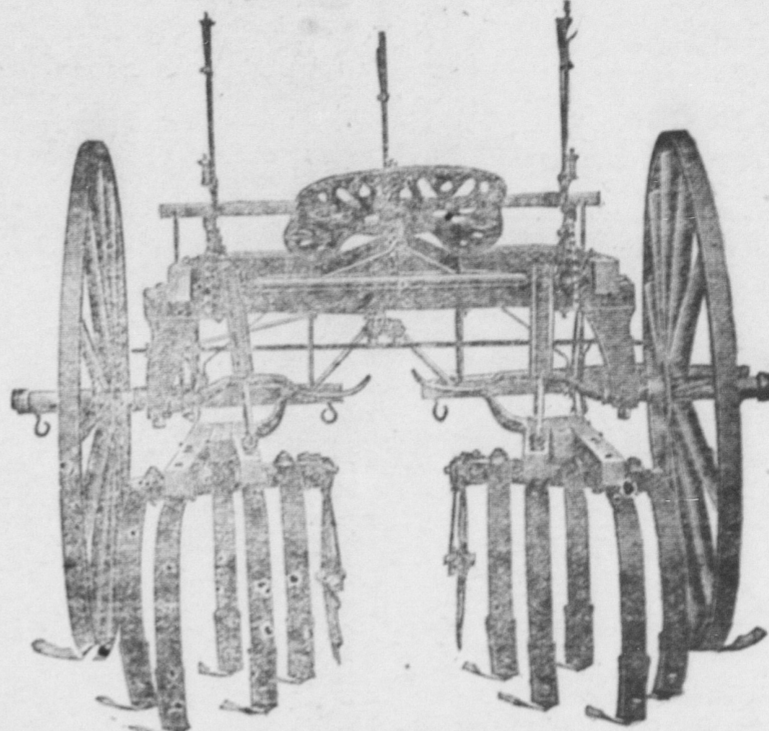

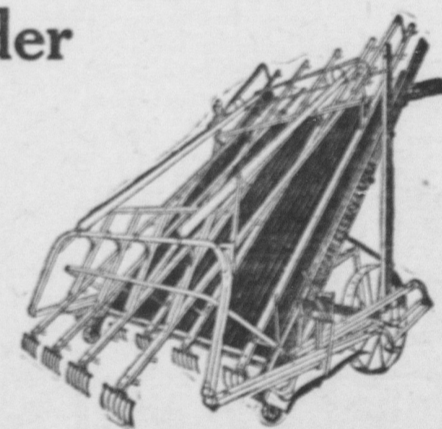
