## BOILED EGGS BETRAY THEM

Nationality of Diners Is Shown in Their Various Methods of Eating.

Sherlock Holmes might have figured this out, but he did not!

The average Englishman will always demand his egg boiled just three minutes, then he places it in an egg cup, just large enough to have the egg fit it, taps the top of the shell, and removes the broken shell with his fingers. The egg is eaten a spoonful at a time.

A Frenchman, much like the Englishman, likes his eggs of three minutes, exactly. He then "peels" them, places them in a glass, stirs and mixes well together with salt, pepper and butter. He makes a practice of dipping bread into the mixture, and eating it along with the eggs.

A Spaniard wouldn't think of letting his egg boil more than one minute. He then breaks it, and lets the contents run into a glass, and consumes it as if he were drinking a glass of wine.

An egg is only fit in an Italian's estimation when it has been placed in cold water, and removed just as the water begins to boil. He then breaks it, pours it on a plate, and proceeds to sop it with bread.

The German, like the Italian, demands his eggs as near the liquid state as possible. He breaks his eggs in an unsightly cup, and scoops the liquid out as if it were soup.

The American is about the only one who prefers his eggs boiled hard. When they are served up to him, he knifes them in half, removes the contents into a glass, after which he adds a plentiful supply of pepper, butter and salt. He then minces the eggs fine, mixing them well with the spices, and eats them with his toast.



## TOOLS FOR A GARDEN

Labor of Growing Vegetables Reduced by Field Methods.

Because Much of Work is to Be Done When Other Things Are Pressing, Gardening Is Too Often Left as Slack Time Job.


Field methods in the garden go a long way toward reducing the labor of growing vegetables. Long rows and the proper tools to work with will do away with 75 per cent, of the tedious hand work, so freely used as an argument against maintaining a garden.

Because a large portion of the work must be done when other work is pressing, gardening is too often left as a slack time job. Doing the right thing at the right time in the garden counts for more than it does, anywhere else on the farm, since garden crops will not stand much neglect.

Two garden tools that will be found very serviceable, and saving of hand labor, are a planker and marker, says the Farmers' Mail and Breeze. Both are homemade affairs, the drawings herewith showing the plan of constructing them. Use the planker on plowed or harrowed ground, just as

Corn Is Productive of Indigestion and Dirt Breeds Disease-Furnish Dry Quarters.

Hog troubles are due to too much dirt and too much corn, says Kansas Farmer. Corn is a fat producer, but not a muscle builder, and an exclusive corn diet during the growing period not only fails to supply the element needed by the animal, but is productive of digestion troubles and weaknesses in the system which invite disease.

Corn is a good element in the ration of any hog at any time. There is nothing better, but it must be balanced by alfalfa, clover or some other nitrogenous feed during the growing periods of pigs and the breeding periods of hogs. There is only one period in the life of the hog when an D exclusive corn ration should be used, and that is at the last end of the fattening period of market hogs.

## SAVE EGGS FOR WINTER NOW

Poultry Department of New York State College of Agriculture Gives Practical Directions.

Eggs at present prices on the farm are cheap food. Next winter, when eggs are scarce and high, why not have plenty of cheap eggs for home use?

The poultry department of the New York state college of agriculture at Cornell university gives the following directions for preserving eggs in waterglass.

The commercial water-glass solution may be obtained from any drug store at a cost of about 20 cents a puart. Mix 11/2 quarts of this solution with eighteen quarts of pure water. Water which has been boiled is preferable. Stir these until they are thoroughly mixed. Two eight-gallon jars are sufficient for thirty dozen eggs, using the amount of solution as prescribed above. After the water-glass is thoroughly mixed divide it into the vessels to be used. Be sure that the vessels are absolutely clean. Place the ergs in the water-glass, see that the tops eggs are covered by at least two inches of the liquid, and cover the jars to prevent evaporation. Place them in a cool place where they will be undisturbed during the year.

Preserve only absolutely fresh eggs. Stale eggs will not keep in any preservative. Have your preservative ready to put the fresh eggs into as you get them. If you are in doubt as to their freshness, candle them, or see if they sink when placed in a dish of water. If any egg sinks it is reasoneggs nor eggs which have been wash-


Water-glass eggs are practically as good as fresh eggs for most cooking purposes. If it is desired to boil them, prick a small hole through the large end of the shell before placing them in the water. The pores of the shell have been sealed with the water-glass solution, and without this pin hole the burst it.

Will Tell You When It Is Time to Talk.

There is a sound magnifying trumpet of flat shape, behind which is a small attachment intended to support the telephone receiver. When it becomes necessary to hold the line, when calling up or replying, instead of the person standing with the receiver glued to his ear he places the receiver upon the time saver, bringing the earpiece into position with the sound magnifier. He is then at liberty to resume his duties until such time as the person required at the opposite end attends his instrument.

This is notified by the speech transmitter being magnified by the time saving device so as to be perfectly audible at a distance. The receiver may then either be withdrawn and held to the ear in the usual way, or left in connection with the magnifier, hearing being quite as simple and easy as under normal conditions. Another advantage of the invention is that the user's two hands are left free to carry out any other requisite task. such as the turning up of documents. making references, writing down meseages or instructions from dictation. and so on.
