AMERICAN INVENTIVE GENIUS.

New Record Shown By the Patent Office Last Year.

Washington.-That the inventive genius of the country is busy is indicated by the annual report of the Commissioner or Patents just made public. Applications for patents during the year totaled 67,986, the largest on record, except for 1912, when there were 16.00; No. 2 clover, \$13.50@15.00. 69,236.

During the year 38,754 patents were granted and 5,166 trade-marks, 664 labels and 254 prints were registered. The receipts from all sources aggregated \$2,082,490; expenditures, \$1,924,-

459, the net revenue being \$158,030. The Patent Office has the distinction of being one of the few bureaus of the government that is operated at a profit the net surplus of the office since its establishment being \$7,-290,103.

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Bradstreet's says:

"Distributing trade has held the centre of the stage this week, and in this line dry goods, clothing and wearing apparel generally have been most active, both at wholesale and retail. Trade tendencies in general, howe er, are onward, and though there are enough exceptions to prevent uniformity, business affairs show further improvement.

"This manifestation may very properly be correlated to the fact that stocks everywhere are light, that rains in the Southwest have superinduced a better feeling there, that colder weather over a wide area in the forepart of the week furnished a reminder that heavy goods were needed besides affording a stimulus to retail trade, and that the crop movement has enlarged with farm produce prices especially remunerative, this latter feature being reflected in somewhat improved collections.

"Most reports indicate that trade is better than it was at this time last year. Moreover, money appears to be a little easier.

"Business failures for the week were 287, which compares with 259 last year.
