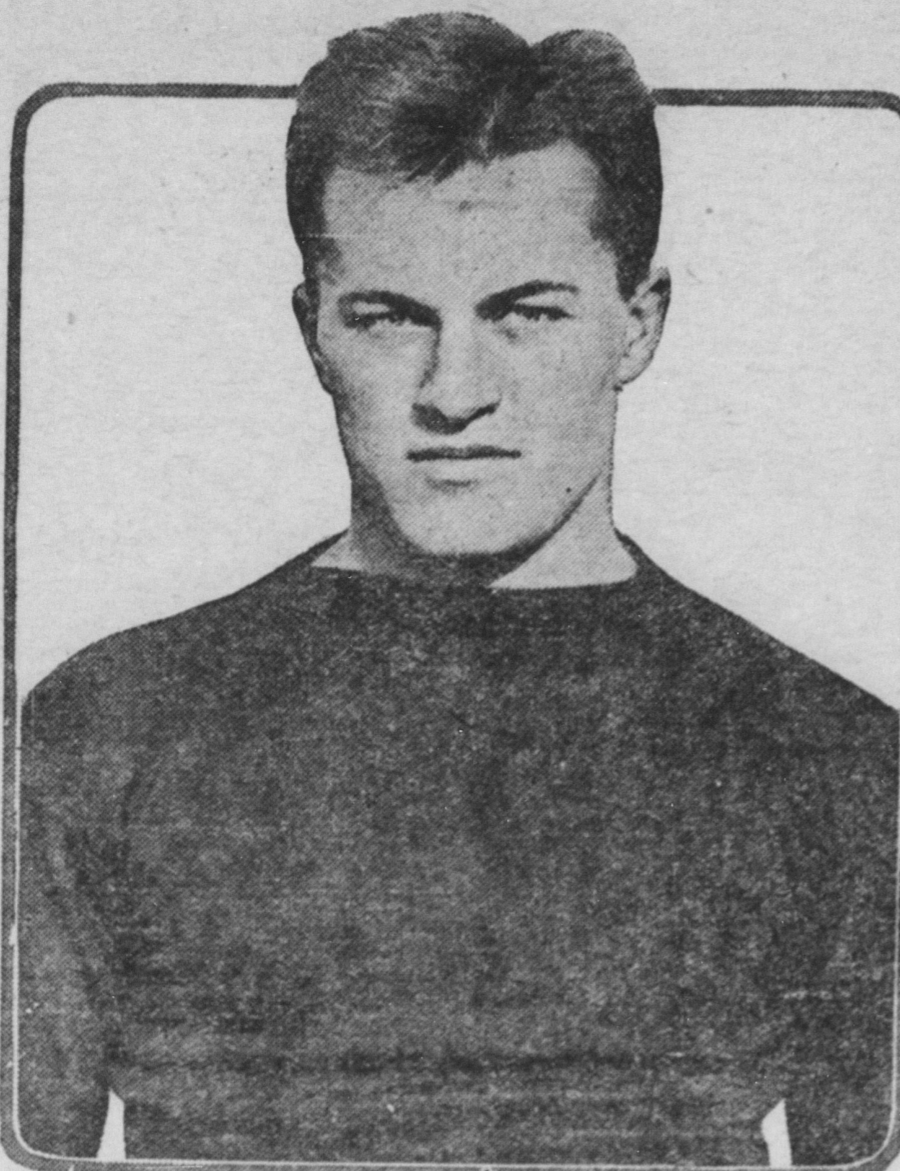

ELBOWS WIN OLYMPIC RACES

President Thompson of American Committee Makes Caustic Reply to Englishman's Accusations.

Thompson, president of the American Olympic committee, declares in the same paper that the charges are grossly absurd. CAREER OF PERCY WENDELL

Former Football Captain of Harvard Was Not Only Great Player, But Popular With Students.

Percy L. Wendell, captain of the Harvard football eleven of 1912, was born in Jamaica Plain, Mass., on July 15, 1890. Before entering Harvard in 1910 Wendell had been a star player on the Roxbury Latin school eleven for three years. During his college career Wendell was not only a great

football player but one of the most popular men at Harvard. He was elected first marshal of the senior class of 1913, the highest class honor at the Cambridge institution, and became president of the class.

AT 73 TAKES UP COURSE IN ATHLETICS

HAVANA WANTS CHESS GAMES

Offer of \$10,000 is Made by Mayor of Havana to Pay Expenses of Tournament in Cuba.

Jose R. Capablanca, chess champion of Cuba, who recently received a commission from the Cuban government as chancellor of the Cuban consulate at St. Petersburg, announced on his arrival in New York the other day from Havana that he had been authorized by Mayor Andrade of Havana to invite ten of the leading masters of the world to play in an international tournament at Havana beginning February 1, 1914. The Havana city council has recommended the expenditure of \$10,000 for the tournament.

Inasmuch as Capablanca will visit London, Paris and other capitals on the way to St. Petersburg, Mayor Andrade took advantage of the opportunity to clothe the young master with this authority in order to save valuable time. This list of masters includes Rubenstein, Schlechter, Tarrasch, Spielmann, Niemzowitsch, Teichmann, Marshall, Duras, Janowski, Alechine, Bernstein, Maroczy, Atkins and Vidmar. Ten of these players will be given places in the tournament. The sum of \$4,200 will be distributed in cash prizes.

Yale's Coliseum.

PICK MAROON TO WIN

Coaches Look Upon Stagg's Squad as "Star" Outfit.

Critics Declare Chicago Holds Advantage in That Minnesota Comes First on List—Not Afraid of Wisconsin Team.

Chicago has been made the center of the western football stage again this season, and from the manner in which the schedules have been "framed" it would appear as if coaches recognized a year ago that the Maroons would be the team to beat this season. No better proof of this could be given than the fact that Minnesota and Wisconsin, which for the last two years have been the principal contenders for the bunting, have arranged their 1913 meeting for as early as November 1, writes Lambert G. Sullivan in the Chicago News.

That Stagg has a better row to hoe is shown by the fact that his men will get little if any training between the Minnesota contest at Minneapolis and the Wisconsin struggle at Chicago. It is extremely fortunate for the Maroons, however, that Minnesota comes first on the list, for Stagg's pupils will be in far better condition for the Gophers than they will be the following week for Wisconsin. It is even possible Stagg will have to depend upon substitutes for the Badgers, for the Minnesota contest is sure to be a gruelling affair.

Minnesota is regarded as the strongest eleven against which the Maroons are to be pitted this year. Coach Williams has a wealth of new material besides nearly all of last year's squad, and the astonishing ease with which the "Giants of the North" trimmed South Dakota last week demonstrated the men are quick to learn as well as possessing the weight and strength requirements for the game. With Shevlin helping "Doc" again this year, the Maroon wings will have to be particularly strong to withstand Minnesota's onslaughts.

Wisconsin does not inspire the fear among adherents of the Maroon which might be expected from the championship squad of the previous season. This is accounted for by the fact that "Germany" Schultz, who last season aided Bill Juneau in the coaching department, has gone back to his alma mater, Michigan, and is assisting Fielding Yost in the same department. The loss of "Germany" is the severest blow which has befallen the Cardinal, not even excepting that of Eddie Gillette, last year's sensational quarterback.

Schultz' coaching last year generally was credited with the rout of the Maroons. Although the former Michigan star had only men at his disposal who had been on previous Wisconsin teams, he did more with them than his predecessors had done. He brought their work to a degree of perfection which only Michigan teams are capable of showing, and it was the forwards even more than the star backs who brought the bunting to Madison last season.

Both Minnesota and Wisconsin have the big edge on the Maroons in that they are able to give undivided attention to one game. The Gophers have nothing to fear from Illinois, whom they meet the final week of the year, and it will be possible for them to put all their efforts against the Maroons. Chicago, on the other hand, will be required to save a great deal of its strength for Wisconsin, which, although not considered to be as tough a proposition as Minnesota, nevertheless is a team against which it is imperative that the men must be at their best.

Wisconsin precedes the Maroon contest with an open date, and has two full weeks of practice following the Ohio State match, which has been arranged for November 8. This should put Juneau's men in rare form for the Maroon battle and make the concluding struggle at Marshall field one of the best in years.

One of the things which are encouraging the Maroons in regard to the Badger game is the conviction shared by last season's veterans that the 1912 Minnesota team was stronger than the 1912 Badger outfit. Although the Maroons were trimmed most decisively by Wisconsin and in turn defeated Minnesota, it is impossible to convince one of them that Minnesota was not the better team. They base their failure against Wisconsin on not being sufficiently prepared. It is known that the Maroons were not familiar with signals and looked like a team which was decidedly overtrained—and the players acknowledge this was the case.

With the two big games coming at the conclusion of the season this year, however, Stagg's pupils are confident the result will be different. With signals thoroughly learned and men trained to the edge, they are certain they will trail the colors of both Minnesota and Wisconsin in the dust.

Murphy is Missed.
Mike Murphy is being missed at Penn. Doctor Hancock, a former football and crew man, is on the field daily with his satchel full of tools helping patch up bruises and cuts. He is the Philadelphia police surgeon at present, but is not figured as capable as Murphy at fixing up the minor hurts that football players suffer.

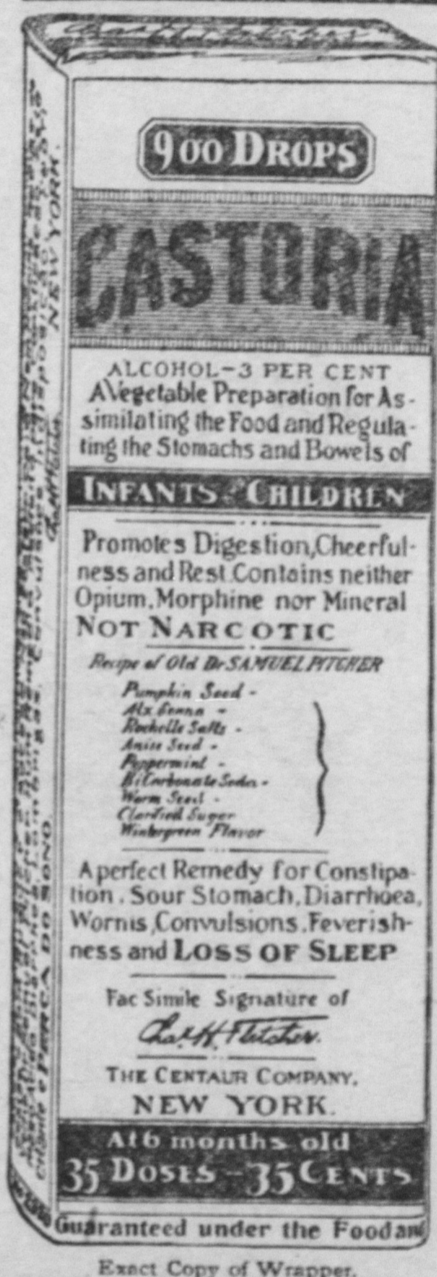

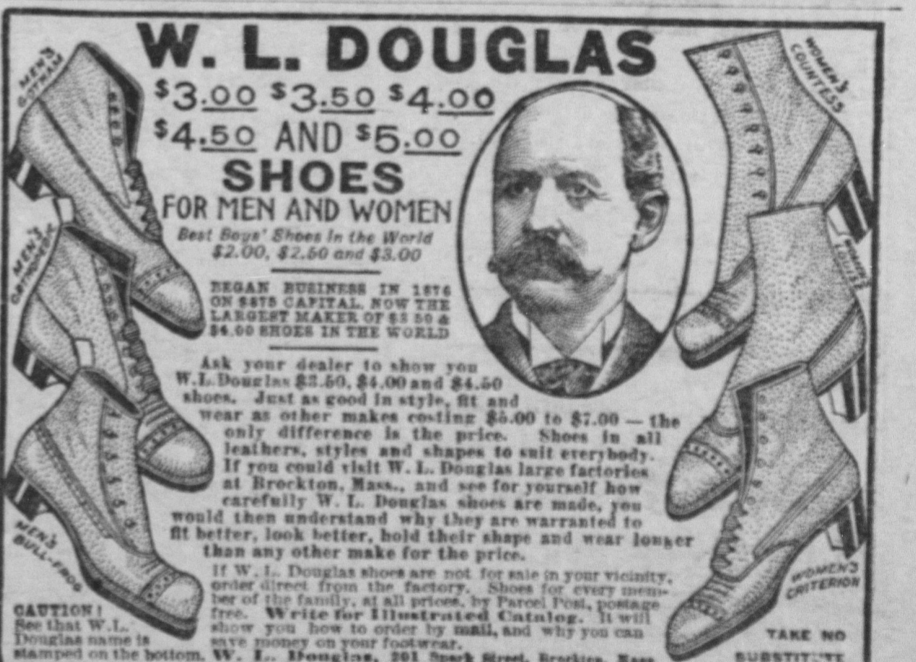
