JAMES POTTER GREGG.

Tyrone School Principal and Counselman, a Product of Potter Township, D. D. in Prisms of Life.

The news of the death of James Potter Gregg, on Saturday evening, was a shock to this community, the home of his birth and boyhood. His illness began on Wednesday previous, but for several months his general health had not been as good as previous years wished. Death was due to paralysis, and occurred at the home of Mrs. Catharine Boger, where he and Mrs. Gregg had been boarding.

Services were held at the Boger home on Sunday afternoon by Rev. W. W. Hartman, pastor of the First Methodist church, assisted by Rev. H. W. Bieber, of the Presbyterian church. The remains were then shipped to the home of the Misses Julia and Susan Gregg, Milesburg, from where the funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon. The services were in charge of the local pastor of the Methodist church, Rev. G. C. King of Everett, and Rev. C. M. Piper, personal friends of the deceased, spoke at the services. Interment was made in the Gregg family burying plot, Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

Mr. Gregg was born on the Gregg farm, west of Centre Hall, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gregg, both deceased. He attended the local schools in the township and borough, and acquired an education much above the average public school pupil, and at one time was spoken of as a possible candidate for the office of superintendent of public schools in Centre county. Almost his whole life was given to school work in one capacity or the other. At the time of his death he was principal of the Adams Avenue school, Tyrone. He had been engaged in that city as an instructor for a number of years. He secured his first position with the Tyrone school board by his willingness to teach a school, the pupils of which had shattered the reputations of several teachers. The acceptance of the position was not without the promise of the school board to give him a free hand. The fine physique of the man, that jaw indicating determination, appealed to the board, and all demanded concessions were made. Mr. Gregg surprised his employers in his method of teaching and governing. The muscle and what the jaw indicated were a reserve. The tactics were closely patterned after the Lindsey idea, and many were the amusing experiences as related by him to the writer. From this position Mr. Gregg rose to that of principal as stated above. He was held in high esteem by his fellow teachers, and at his burial, on the day of burial, nearly all the teachers gathered.

It was not only in school work that Mr. Gregg was honored in Tyrone, but confidence in his judgment was shown by electing him a member of the council. He was prominently identified with the Allegheny Gateway lodge, No. 187, Independent Order of Old Fellows; Tyrone encampment and the canton branches; also of the Foresters, Modern Woodmen and Knights of Malta.

There survive the deceased his wife, Mrs. Mollie Sankey Gregg, and these brothers and sisters: John, of Raton, N. M.; Andrew, of Allentown; Mrs. Mary Miller of Raton, N. M., and Mrs. Annie E. Emiston of State College. Mr. Gregg was aged forty-seven years and a few days.
