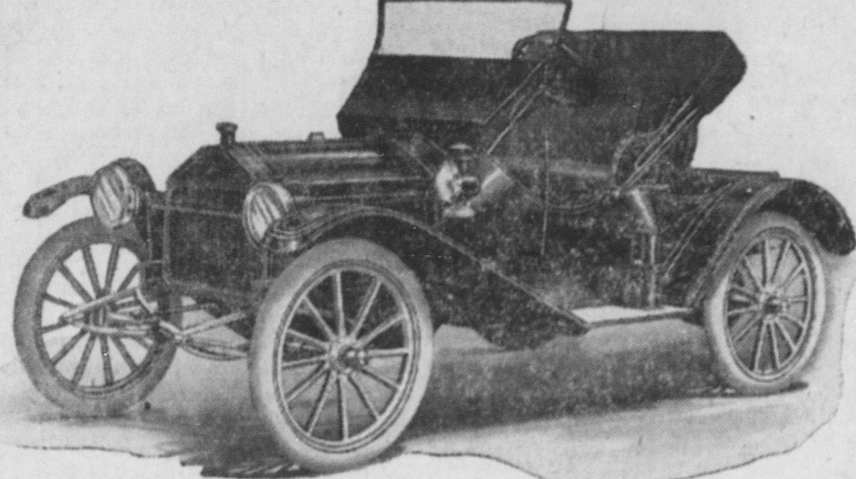
LOCAL.
