CIGARMAKERS TO STOP "LICKING"

Commissioner Jackson Issues Notice That Practice Shall Cease

RESULT OF INSPECTIONS

Operatives in Factories Were Wetting Tips of Cigars With Their Lips During Process of Manufacture—Undesirable and Unsafe.

(Special Harrisburg Correspondence.)
 Harrisburg—Notice was given by Commissioner John Price Jackson, of the State Department of Labor and Industry, that people in charge of cigar factories must immediately stop the practice of cigar makers placing tips of cigars in their mouths during manufacture. This order is the result of inspections recently made by the division of hygiene of the department, who found that operatives were wetting the tips of cigars with their lips. Of thirty-eight factories inspected in the western end of the State it was found that in eight the cigarmakers were putting the end of the cigars into their mouths. "Inasmuch as the practice of licking or wetting the end of the cigar seems to be a more or less prevalent practice and one which is not only unsafe to the operative, but certainly undesirable for the smoker, the commissioner gives notice that this practice must be absolutely done away with," said Dean Jackson.

New Charters Issued.

State charters were issued to the Olney Suburban, Thomas W. Gillespie, Sixth street and Washington avenue and Forty-eighth Ward Building and Loan Associations, all of Philadelphia, each with a capital of \$1,000,000. Other charters issued were to True Blue State Company, Easton, capital \$5,000; the Belmont Company, hotel, Yoe, capital \$5,000; Buffalo Valley Farmers and Consumers Company, Lewisburg, capital \$5,000; Auto Supply Company, Allentown, capital \$10,000; Dickinson Reeves Company, motors, Philadelphia capital \$10,000; Hellam Furniture Company, Hellam, capital \$20,000; Kresge Shoe Company, Philadelphia, capital \$10,000; Keystone Screw Company, Philadelphia, capital \$50,000; P. McManus Company, construction, Philadelphia, capital \$100,000.

Demurs to Coal Tax Bill.

A demurrer to the action in equity brought by the People's Coal Company of Scranton, to test the constitutionality of the anthracite coal tax act of 1913, was filed by the Attorney General's department in behalf of Auditor-General Powell and State Treasurer Young. The demurrer declares that the Dauphin County Court is without jurisdiction; that the bill does not state any facts entitling the company to relief; that the bill contains "many wholly irrelevant, immaterial, scandalous and impertinent matters and does not show on its face that the plaintiff is entitled to any relief which it seeks;" that the bill does not show the act to be unconstitutional in any respect.

Former Railroad Commissioner Dies.

John Y. Boyd, a former member of the state railroad commission and one of the wealthiest residents of Harrisburg, died here. He was 52 years old. Since his resignation from the Railroad Commission he has devoted his time to the management of the Boyd estate, which owns a railroad, mining and farming properties. Although he had been in ill health for a year, his death was unexpected. Mr. Boyd was born at Danville, but had lived here since he was 14 years of age. He was a graduate of Princeton.

Court Litigant Admitted.

Among the admissions to the Superior Court bar was R. W. Aiken, prominent Milford county attorney, one of the parties in the Aiken divorce suit from that county. The case was argued shortly after he was admitted. The court heard the conclusion of the argument of Kuhns vs. Supervisors of Upper Allen township, Cumberland county, in which damages were claimed for injury to an automobile through bad roads and received the Lupp case from Adams on papers. The Dauphin cases listed were Smith estate, West vs. Hanna and Lightner estate.

Women Prepare to Quiz.

Leaders in the woman suffrage movement in Pennsylvania held a two-day conference on legislative campaigns here. Seventy-five representatives of district organizations were present, and plans to quiz candidates were discussed, together with outlines for meetings.

New Chief Named.

J. J. Monroe Campbell, of Philadelphia, a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and lately connected with the laboratories of the State Department of Health, was selected as chief of the division of biological products by Commissioner Dixon. He succeeds H. W. Pierson who resigned. Dr. Campbell has had wide experience as a pathologist and is one of the ablest men connected with the laboratory work which has been such an important feature of the work of Dr. Dixon's big department.

COMMERCIAL

Weekly Review of Trade and Market Reports.

Dun's Review says:
 "Recovery from the blizzard was comparatively prompt and the lifting of railroad blockades and resumption of telegraphic service brought a more normal condition. Reports from leading commercial centers, however, continue of a mixed character, increased activity in certain directions contrasting with dullness in others. Failures this week are 334, against 283 last year."
