DEATHS.

John Shank, an aged resident of Bellefonte, died at the home of his son-in-law, Frank E. Naghney, of diseases incident to his advanced age.

Deceased was born in Warriors Mark Valley on January 23rd, 1828 hence was eighty-six years, one month and seventeen days old. When a young man he learned the wagon-making trade, an occupation he followed at Warriors Mark until October, 1887, when he moved to Bellefonte. After coming to Bellefonte he worked at his trade a number of years until incapacitated by age. During the past few years both Mr. and Mrs. Shank have made their home with Mr. and Mrs. Naghney.

On September 9th, 1851, Mr. Shank was united in marriage at Warriors Mark to Miss Rebecca Shoup, who survives with the following children: Mrs. Edward Rowe of Albuquerque, New Mexico; Mrs. George B. Brandon of Scranton; and Mrs. Frank E. Naghney of Bellefonte. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. John A. Baer and Miss Sarah A. Shank of Altoona.

Victor B. Luse died of consumption after an illness of a few weeks at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Luse, at Fairview, aged thirty-six years. He was born in Millhelm, and moved to West Fairview with his parents some years ago.
