

DEATHS.

Dr. William B. Stiver, a prominent Freeport, Illinois, physician and native of Potter township, died on Saturday morning while on his way from his home to his office. He was observed by a friend to stagger, and soon after assistance came he died without uttering a word. He had not been in good health for some time, but his family thought his condition just at that time to be normal.

Dr. Stiver was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Stiver, and was born near Potters Mills, Potter township. In 1872 he went to Lena, Illinois, and after two years took up the study of medicine in Freeport, and finished his preparation for the profession upon graduating from Rush Medical College, Chicago. He began to practice in Orangeville, Illinois, and in 1876 located at Rock Grove, from there he went to Lena, and after ten years he settled in Chicago, remaining until 1896. Later he returned to Freeport, where he remained until his death.

Dr. Stiver was married to Miss Rebecca McNitt, who with a daughter survives. Hon. P. O. Stiver and Dr. R. J. Stiver of Freeport, and Mrs. J. E. Ward of Bellefonte are surviving brothers and sisters.

This is the fifth death among the Stiver brothers and sisters in less than four years. S. L. Stiver, the eldest, died three years ago last November at Bunker Hill, Ill.; Mrs. W. B. Krape of Aaronsburg, died a year ago last December; Dr. Thomas J. Stiver, an ex-lieutenant in the army, died August 1st; David Stiver passed away last November.

Irs I. Burwell, a most highly respected citizen of this township, died Monday morning at three o'clock at his home immediately east of Pine Grove Mills. His death was due to heart failure. His serious illness dated back ten days when pneumonia took hold of him and later heart trouble developed. His condition was somewhat improved Sunday and his friends with heart he chatted on that day, but sure of his recovery. An attack at his heart early Monday morning was so serious as to result in his death.

Mr. Burwell was a native of West Virginia and for a number of years followed the carpenter trade. He moved to near Pine Grove Mills thirteen years ago and of recent years was engaged in farming. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and was active in its branches, especially in the Sunday school, where he was a teacher. At the time of his death he was fifty years of age. He is survived by his wife, three sons and four daughters, all of whom are at home except one daughter who lives at Tyrone. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon and interment was made at Pine Grove Mills.

Mrs. Ellen Jane Marshall Cook died in Bellefonte Wednesday of last week following an attack of apoplexy with which she was stricken the day before. Funeral services were held at her late home Saturday afternoon, conducted by her pastor, Rev. George E. Hawes, D. D., and interment was made in the Union cemetery.

Deceased was born in Buffalo Run valley sixty years ago and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph W. Marshall. Her kindly nature won for her the esteem of a large circle of friends who will note her death with much regret. Besides her husband, Charles F. Cook, she leaves one son and one daughter—Marshall and Eleanor Cook—and the following brothers and sisters: J. L. Marshall on the old homestead in Buffalo Run; James G. Marshall, Niagara Falls; Mrs. George Musser, Curtin; Mrs. D. H. Shively, Buffalo Run; Mrs. W. A. Alexander, Unionville; and Mrs. D. M. Campbell, Linden Hall.

Mrs. William Bilger died at her home in Pleasant Gap, at the age of sixty-three years. Her death was due to cancer, from which she suffered for several years. She was a faithful member of the Lutheran church and a woman of kind disposition. Funeral services were held in the Lutheran church at Pleasant Gap, Rev. Stoneycypher of Boalsburg, officiating.

She leaves her husband, William Bilger and two sons, Charles Bilger, Pleasant Gap, and Harry Bilger, at home. These brothers also survive, namely: Peter Stine, of Kansas; Adam Stine, of Oklahoma; Chas. Stine, of Colorado; David Stine, of Washington; and Edward Stine, of Idaho.

William F. Thomas died in a Philadelphia hospital from cancer of the stomach from which he suffered for several years. The remains were brought to Mill Hill, near which place he lived during the past two years, for interment. His age was about forty-five years, and he is survived by a wife and three children. A sister, Mrs. Creighton, of Renovo, also survives.

The deceased was the only son of Adam Thomas, and spent his boyhood days in Centre Hall with his parents. Emanuel Summers died at Alto, Saturday, April 18, of diabetes, aged fifty-one years. He was engaged as sawyer at George B. Thompson's saw mill at Alto up to within a short time of his death. He is survived by his wife, his father, Malachi Summers, and three brothers: James Summers of Axe Mann; Moist Summers of Niagara Falls; and Winfield Summers of Bellefonte. He was buried at McClure, Snyder county.

William Benjamin Fredericks died at the home of his brother-in-law, John F. Holt, in Union township, after a few days illness with pneumonia. He was fifty-seven years of age. He leaves his mother, Mrs. Jessie Fredericks, and two sisters, Mrs. Elmer Roller of Ohio, and Mrs. John F. Holt, at whose home he died.
