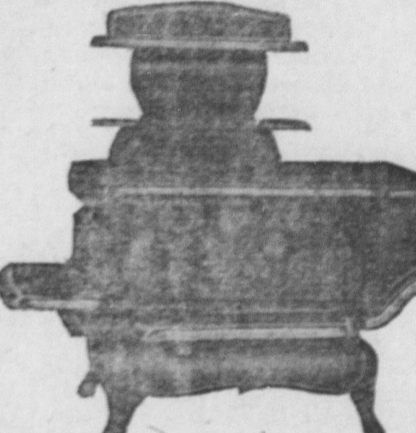

Whether or not he himself personally assisted the discredited bi-partisan gang, his present friends and his chief supporters were the soul and spirit of the movement to resist the efforts of the honest Democrats to reorganize, but, fortunately for the State, for the city, and for the credit of the Democratic party, they met with overwhelming defeat. The nomination of Mr. Ryan now would mean the overthrow of those reorganizers and a return to power in the Democratic party of the intriguers, manipulators and discredited bosses who brought disgrace upon their party during the last decade. The Public Ledger does not charge that Mr. Ryan personally is either sympathetic with or is active in this faction, but his nomination would mean victory for it.
