PRISONERS RECAPTURED.

Irjary of One Checks Flight and Both are Taken in Bald Eagle Mountains,

John Bair and Pasquale Carmillo, the latter an Italian, both of whom escaped from the barracks at the new penitentiary, near Bellefonte, on Sunday night were recaptured within 24 hours. These two prisoners were on the parole system being employed on the construction work of the new penitentiary and were given more burg. freedom than those within the prison
