**PRISONERS RECAPTURED.**

Injury of One Checks Flight and Both are Taken in Bald Eagle Mountains.  
John Bair and Pasquale Carmillo, the latter an Italian, both of whom escaped from the barracks at the new penitentiary, near Bellefonte, on Sunday night were recaptured within 24 hours. These two prisoners were on the parole system being employed on the construction work of the new penitentiary and were given more freedom than those within the prison walls.

Immediately upon learning of the escape Deputy Warden Daufenbach sent a description of the prisoners broadcast and two overseers were scouring the country about Centre Hall early Monday morning.

The deputy warden and Officer Houser traced the two men to the Bald Eagle Mountains, about three miles from the penitentiary, and finally came upon the escaped felons. One of the men had been injured and could not proceed.

The prisoners were taken to Bellefonte to answer an additional charge of attempting to escape from the penitentiary, which will be the technical charge, in addition to serving the remainder of their term.
