ATOP A FAST TRAIN

Men On Freight Hit Overhead Bridge Trains On Lackawanna Had Been Robbed Recently, So They Were Guarded.

Paterson, N. J.-In an attempt to rob a fast freight train on the Lackawanna Railroad two men were killed. Three other members of the gang of five escaped when detectives caused the train to slow down in an effort to affect their capture.

The freight train leaves Hoboken nightly and few stops are made, as its cargo is principally valuable silk bound for mills in Pennsylvania. The cars have been entered and robbed several times recently and railroad detectives were assigned to guard it. When the train swung out on the main line at the west end of the Bergen tunnel the detectives began to search the cars. PASSED BY HOUSE

Conference Report Agreed to By the Senate.

UNANIMOUS FOR MEASURE

Congress Now Has Only the War Revenue and Philippine Measures To Dispose Of Before Adjournment.

Washington, D. C .- The conference report on the Clayton anti-trust bill already adopted by the Senate, was agreed to by the House, 244 to 54, completing the anti-trust legislation program for this session. Twentytwo Republicans and six Progressives voted with the solid Democratic membership for the report. With this out of the way Congress has only the war revenue bill and the Philippine measure to dispose of to be ready for adjournment in accordance with the administration plan for the session. The House is expected to pass the Philippine bill, but it will not be considered before adjournment in the

Primarily the Clayton bill, as finally enacted, fixes guilt upon individuals connected with corporations which violate the anti-trust laws. It prohibits unfair price discrimination and the interlocking or directorates of two directors of railroad corporations with stock supply companies and limits the interlocking of bank directors. The bill also prohibits the existence of holding companies which would substantially lessen competition, and forbids exclusive and tying contracts. Provisions of the act liberalize the Washington, D.
