Entered at the Post Office in Centre Hall as by a falling limb of a tree while cutting timber in the mountain a short distance from his home.

KILLED BY FALLING LIMB.

The facts in the fatal accident are these: Mr. Ruble, who for the past four years had been employed by Miss Kimport, who owns a farm and some mountain land near Linden Hall, left home about nine o'clock for the purpose of cutting a few logs. George Markle, a neighbor, had planned to go with him, but owing to other work requiring Lis attention, did not do so. Mr. Ruble started for the woods alone and when he failed to put in his appearance at the noon hour, Miss Kimport became uneasy, but did not entertain any grave fears until about two o'clock, when she went to the home of her cousin, John Kimporf, living nearby, asking him to make a trip to the mountain and ascertain the reason for his failure to come home. 


