While seated in a chair in front of the Centre Hall hotel, Monday evening, Charles E. Decker was suddenly seized with an attack of acute indigestion and fell unconscious to the pavement. He was taken into the hotel parlor and Dr. H. S. Brauch of Spring Mills summoned. It was some time until he revived sufficiently to be taken to his home, where he is slowly improving.

Rev. J. Homer Kerr, who preaches in the Presbyterian church next Sunday, was pastor of this church and that of Spring Mills from May 25th, 1885 to August 27, 1889. It was during his pastorate that the present Presbyterian church building was erected. The only other ex-pastor of this church now living is Mr. Kerr's immediate predecessor, the Rev. W. K. Foster, born and reared in this community, now pastor of the flourishing church of Jenkintown, near Philadelphia.

DEATHS.

Death claimed a noble christian woman when the soul of Mrs. Chester Moyer, wife of William Moyer, took its flight to its Maker, Wednesday of last week, at her home in Loganton.

Two years ago Mrs. Moyer sustained a paralytic stroke and since that time she had been practically helpless. Funeral services were held in the Reformed church at Rebersburg, Saturday afternoon and burial made at that place, Rev. A. G. Stauffer, assisted by the Lutheran and Evangelical ministers from Loganton, officiating.

Mrs. Moyer was the daughter of John and Susan Weaver and was born in Brush Valley seventy years ago. The greater part of her life was spent there. She was held in high esteem by her many friends and her passing away is deeply mourned. Besides her husband three children survive, namely, Charles, of Reading; Earl, of Loganton, and Mrs. Maggie Frank, of Johnstown. One brother and one sister also survive: Daniel Weaver and Mrs. John Minnich, of Wolf's Store.

Mrs. Wesley Sigle died at her home in State College Friday morning from the effects of a paralytic stroke sustained Tuesday previous. She had just recovered from an illness with pneumonia. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon and burial made in the Pine Hill cemetery, Rev. J. McHenry Riley, of the Methodist church, officiating. Surviving her are her husband and three children: Ira and David, State College; Irvin, Albert, William and Mary, at home; also three brothers, namely, Jesse, Altona; John and Lemuel, State College.

James Miller, one of Miles township's oldest residents, died at his home in Smullton, Saturday, of old age, being in his eighty-first year. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the Lutheran church at Rebersburg and burial made at that place, Rev. J. L. Metzgar, officiating. Surviving him are his wife and the following children, namely, Elmer, near Rebersburg; Rev. Luther Miller, Maryland; Mrs. Anna Winkler, Renovo.

More Mountain Fires.
Monday morning fire broke out in Poe Valley and spread so rapidly that in a comparatively short time it covered two mountains and was four miles in length, extending from the Kuhn Lingle place to the new pike. Foresters Montgomery and Siggins of Potters Mills, on the west, Forester Meek, on the east, and Forester Warfield on the south, with a force of nearly a hundred men, fought the fire systematically and by Tuesday evening had it practically under control. The ground burned over was nearly all state land.

About a mile south of Boalsburg, on Bald Top mountain, Forester Ludwig, assisted by a number of State College students, fought a severe fire which burned over hundreds of acres. The rain on Tuesday afternoon sided materially in putting out the fire. Another fire of big dimensions raged in the barrens near State College and was fought by nearly all students.
