Group Six comprises the counties of Centre, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Clearfield and Huntingdon. John D. Meyer, cashier of the Second National Bank, of Altoona, is secretary and treasurer of the association.

Second Week of Court.

Court convened on Monday morning and after hearing motions and petitions the trial list was taken up, as follows:

Kate E. Hastings as an individual vs. Kate E. Hastings, administratrix, et al., of Enoch H. Hastings, deceased; being an action to revive a judgment. Verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2265.95.

W. R. Williams, sole acting administrator of A. Williams, deceased, vs. Ellen E. Bower and John J. Bower, administrators, et al., of C. M. Bower, deceased; being an action to revive the lien of a judgment. Verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$329.36.

Oliver C. Witmer, James Witmer, and W. G. Runkle, executors of William Witmer, deceased, vs. J. E. Garner and Samuel Garner; being an action to revive and continue the lien of a judgment in the sum of \$325. Plaintiff offered a note borrowed by the defendants in July, 1905, for amount above named. The defendants by depositions taken several years ago testified that they had prior to the time of giving of the note in suit, borrowed from Mr. Witmer \$700, and that the \$700 note was paid, the most of it in cash and by the giving of a small check, and that the \$325 note was subsequently paid by J. F. Garner by a check of something over \$422, including some grain that the defendant had bought from Mr. Witmer, and that both notes were fully paid by Mr. Witmer in his lifetime. The plaintiffs contending that the \$325 had not been paid and that the \$422 check was a payment of the balance in full of the \$700 note. Verdict on Tuesday morning in favor of the defendant.

Peter Mendis vs. A. E. Schad; being an action to recover on note and book accounts. Verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$115.87.

George C. Harvey vs. Pennsylvania R. E. company; being an action brought to recover for the taking of land when the railroad company improved the Bald Eagle Valley railroad in 1913, and for damages by reason of the taking that might ensue therefrom, the location being in Boggs and Howard townships. The plaintiffs contending that the damage was considerable in amount while the witnesses for the defendant contend that the damages are not as great as claimed by the plaintiff and are little more than the value of the land taker.

Buys Keratetter Store at Coburn.
Charles M. Smith of Sunbury, well known throughout this section as a salesman for the David Miller dry goods and notion house of Baltimore, embarked in the mercantile business at Coburn, having purchased the J.
