Templars Vote Against Booze.

Knights Templar, a branch of Masonry, in Pennsylvania, have voted against liquor. By an overwhelming majority the members of the Grand Commandery of this State, who ended their annual convocation in Philadelphia last Wednesday, decided that in the future no man connected, either directly or indirectly, with the liquor business should be admitted to membership in this branch of Masonry.

This blow at the liquor business was taken at the final business session of the grand body. As at all the sessions of the Grand Commandery, only members of that convocation were admitted. The resolution that called forth this action was presented by William Foster, a member of Kadosh Commandery, No. 29, of Philadelphia. It precipitated strong discussion, for a similar motion was presented a year ago, but was tabled. Wednesday its advocates refused to let the matter be downed. When the roll was called the opponents of the resolution were outnumbered nearly 3 to 1. A bare majority would have been sufficient to carry the resolution.

How to Fight Fire-Blight.

Fire-blight, the disease that is reported to be attacking fruit orchards in Southeastern Pennsylvania, is described and methods of treatment are suggested by Dr. F. D. Kern, head of the department of botany at the Pennsylvania State College. He said:

"Fire-blight is a bacterial disease of the apple, pear and quince. Its presence is indicated by the blighting of twigs, from tips downward, to which the leaves cling strongly. The effect is likened to a tree scorched by fire or injured by frost. The first danger in the growing season is the blighting of the flowers, and sometimes the young setting fruits are rotted and destroyed. Large roughened areas often appear on the larger limbs known as the blight canker, in which the bacteria live over winter. Warm, cool, moist weather favors the development of the blight and the younger growth is more susceptible.

"Fire-blight can be controlled by giving careful and prompt attention to the removal of all infected parts. Infected twigs and water sprouts should be cut at least six inches below any sign of bark discoloration; all cankers should be cut out and the cuts disinfected with bichloride of mercury in strength of one part to one thousand of water. This material is very poisonous and should be handled with great care.

"Insects are concerned in the spread of fire-blight and the control of aphids and red bugs should greatly reduce the further spread of the disease."

Dixon's Health Talks.

We have been taught that the tooth brush should be as indispensable from youth to old age as a man's shadow. Indeed the latter might be dispensed with without jeopardizing one's position in polite society.

The primary purpose of the tooth brush is excellent, but it is well remembered that as it is intended to clean, the instrument itself should be beyond suspicion in this regard. The majority of disease germs find their way into the human system through the mucous membrane of the nose and mouth.

If the teeth are not frequently and properly cleaned these germs or bacteria will multiply in cavities or where particles of food have become lodged between the teeth. These minute germ breeding centers should be removed by vigorous brushing but when the desired result is accomplished care should be taken that they do not in turn lodge in the intricacies of the tooth brush. If they remain there they are later retransferred to the mouth.

To guard against this the brush should be thoroughly cleaned before and after using in scalding water if this is obtainable. If not, in some non-poisonous antiseptic wash. At least wash the brush with soap and water and rinse thoroughly.

Care should be taken not to keep a tooth brush where it is exposed to dust and dirt. If there are several members of the family the same receptacle should not be used for the brushes as the germs of disease may readily be transmitted from one brush to another in this manner.

It is well to make use of white thread or dental floss to remove particles from between the teeth which are difficult to remove with the brush. It is from fragments of food that lodge between the teeth that decay often starts.
