

READY FOR CELEBRATION.

Odd Fellows Have Good Program Prepared for Saturday.—Two Bands Will be Here.

Saturday will be a gala day for Centre Hall if the weather man does his part in supplying a brand of weather which will permit the carrying out of an extensive sports program which the Odd Fellows have planned for the day. Two bands have been secured and there will be no lack of good music from morning until night. The much-talked-of Orphanage band, composed of boys ranging in age from nine years to sixteen will be an attraction second to none and a large turnout is expected to hear these little musicians who are wonders with their instruments. The popular Boalsburg band will also be on hand all day so there will be music galore and no occasion for a dull moment in the day's festivities.

The opening of the celebration is Friday evening when a festival will be held on Grange Park. The Orphanage band will be on hand and render a concert. Everybody is invited. On Saturday morning, starting at ten o'clock, a grand parade will open the celebration for the day. The line of march will start from the school ground and go to the station, returning from there to Grange Park. The parade promises to be a big one, for a number of lodges, both Odd Fellows and Eagles, throughout the valley, have agreed to participate. The children of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs will be in a group and the baseball teams of the day will march in their uniforms. The fantastic parade promises to eclipse anything ever attempted here and with the support of the Pleasant Garden-makers there will be sights to cause pain in the side from laughter.

A big lot of sports, in which everybody is invited to compete, will start at one o'clock. There will be a 100-yard dash, 50-yard dash for girls, point race, fat man's race, lemon race, storm race for Rebekahs, ball throwing contest for women, nail driving contest for women, shot put, shoe lacing contest, and others. Prizes will be awarded the winners in every contest. Following this a good game of baseball will take place between the home team and Spring Mills. A great deal of friendly rivalry exists between the two nines and Saturday's game will decide the winner of a three-game series, since each club has won a game from the other. A trap shooting contest will follow the ball game. This promises to be a big feature and a number of good shots will attempt to

capture one of the three cash prizes. It will be possible to secure a good dinner and supper on the grounds at reasonable rates, and the local order having this feature in charge, will serve good meals. 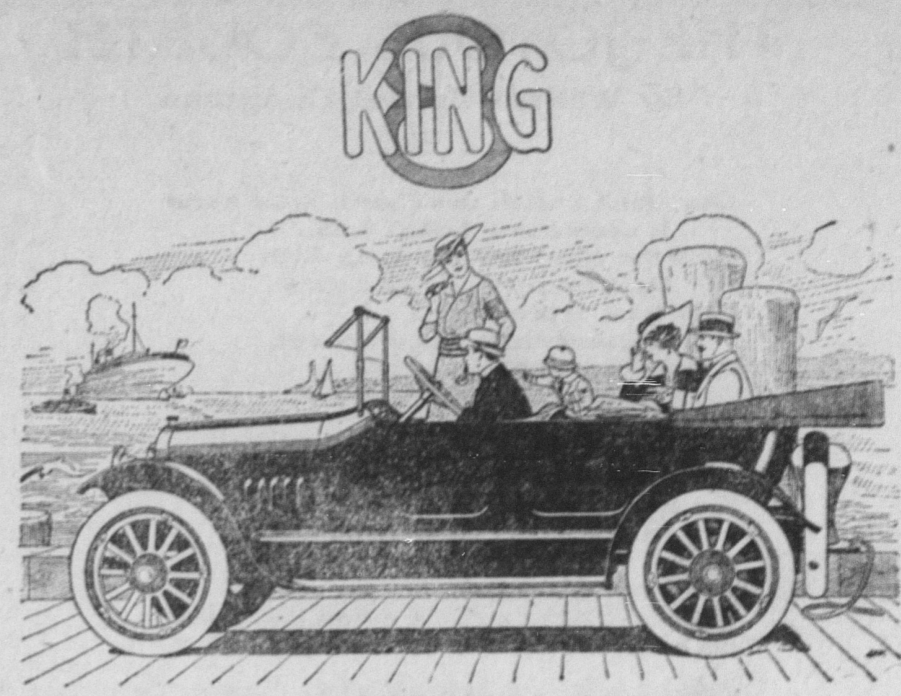
