Bounty Payments Trimmed Down.

Dr. Joseph Kalbfus, secretary of the state game commission, estimates that from 25 to 35 per cent. of the claims made by counties upon the state for reimbursement for bounties paid for noxious animals and birds will be rejected. These claims, which have been accumulating for two years back, are being passed upon and many of them are being turned down flatly because of frauds. The frauds are not confined to any particular locality, but according to the commission secretary seem to be general all over the state.

Claims for payments of bounties under the act of 1915 are now being made at the rate of forty-five a day and are accompanied by heads and pelts, which make the work of the commission force very real indeed.

Under the new system Dr. Kalbfus estimates that the state will save \$100,000 in two years and this will be saved to the sportsmen who pay in the hunters' license fee for game protection and propagation.
