GERMAN OFFICERS LEAD BULGARIANS

Allies Will Defend Serbia and Greece Against Bulgars.

TO LAND TROOPS AT SALONIKI

Teutons Reported With Bulgarians. Entente Powers "Bound To Support" the States Threatened.

London.—A dispatch from Reuter's Telegram Company from Athens says: "Latest advices from Sofia, Bulgaria, point to German influence gaining ground daily. It is naturally concluded that the chances of maintaining peace in the Balkans are remote."

Like Case in Turkey.

The Foreign Secretary authorized the following statement: "Information has been received that German and Austrian officers have for several days been arriving in Bulgaria with a view to taking an active part in directing the Bulgarian army. This action is precisely similar to that taken in Turkey, where German officers forced Turkey to make an entirely unprovoked attack upon Russia last year. "Since the allied powers are bound to support the states who are threatened by such proceedings in Bulgaria, this news is regarded as of the utmost gravity."

Allies Prepared.

Paris.—The Temps announces that France and Great Britain already have taken military measures to defend Serbia and Greece against Bulgarian aggression.

The Temps does not indicate what armed steps have been taken by the Allies nor is anything official available respecting their military dispositions. It is presumed in military circles here, however, that a formidable expedition will land either at Kavala or Saloniki, or that it already may be landing.

The indications are that Italy and Russia are co-operating with France and Great Britain in the execution of this joint movement, although the actual military forces probably will be drawn from Great Britain and France, and that the Italians will lend their aid in the Mediterranean and the Russians on the Black Sea front.

The allied movement, it is stated here, is designed to offset the agreement said to have been effected between Bulgaria and the Teutonic Allies under which Bulgaria will act against Serbia before October 15. It is understood that Great Britain felt disposed to wait the result of that eventuality, but that French diplomacy favored an immediate initiative for the purpose of overcoming any Bulgarian menace to Serbia before it could be put into effect.

A Minister of one of the Balkan states said that Bulgaria had never replied to the joint note of the Triple Entente Allies, submitting Serbia's concessions to Bulgaria with regard to Macedonia. Instead of replying, this Minister said, Bulgaria had ordered a mobilization within a few days after she received the Allies' joint note. This mobilization, in the opinion of the Minister, was in itself an adverse reply, and he expressed the belief that Bulgaria did not intend to make any further answer to the Allies.

There are indications in Paris that both these moves are under way or in contemplation, and the Temps' definite announcement appears to assure the early execution of the expeditionary move.

London.—The French and British forces apparently have made no further progress, except in the region of Neuville, in Artois, but on the other hand, they have been successful in repulsing the German counter attacks and so far as is known have held virtually all the ground gained.

New progress for the Allied troops in the Givenchy wood, the capture of additional German machine guns and prisoners in the Champagne region and the stopping of a German bombardment in the Argonne by a French counter offensive are recorded in the French official communication made public.

In the east, the Russians appear to be making a much better effort to hold their positions, for except just in front of Dvinsk and in Volhynia the Germans claim to have made no progress, while between those two points and in Galicia, according to a Berlin official report, all the attacking is being done by the Russians. Indeed, the Russian troops, by countering the attack which Field Marshal von Hindenburg launched at Minsk from the northwest, have succeeded pretty well in straightening out their line from north to south.

10,000 CAMBRIDGE MEN IN WAR.

470 Killed, 700 Wounded and Over 300 Decorated.

London.—Ten thousand Cambridge men are fighting or in training to fight for the defense of their country. Already 470 have been killed, 700 have been wounded and more than 300 have won distinction on the field. These figures were given by Vice-Chancellor James in his address at the beginning of the academic year.
