

QUIETLY NOW THE COURT.

Ceremony Performed Monday Forenoon—Court and Other Appointments.

On Monday before the noon hour Henry C. Qigley, the judge-sit for Centre county, took the oath of office, the same having been administered by Recorder Brown, who himself had just subscribed to the oath. The Republican leaders had arranged to have a fair sized audience assembled to witness the solemn yet simple ceremony. After the formalities of taking the oath had been accomplished by Mr. Qigley, Attorney John Blanchard made a brief address, the substance of which expressed the desire of unity and good feeling between the court and attorneys practicing at the bar. In a very few words Judge Qigley responded, assuring fair usage to all attorneys, and asked the indulgence of the attorneys due an inexperienced court.

The court then called District Attorney-elect Furst to the bar, where Probationary Foreman administered the oath.

DEATHS.

James Cornely, aged sixty years, a character for many years in Bellefonte, was found dead on Thursday in the tool house connected with the Bellefonte steam and heat plant, where he had worked for a long time and about which place he was a general utility man. It is presumed that he lay dead since the Sunday previous to the finding of his body. It was known that he had laid in a big stock of fire water for a Christmas celebration and it was from the effects of the spree that his death occurred. He was a bachelor.

The body of Mrs. Emanuel Brown, who died at Millroy last week, was taken to Spring Mills on Saturday and funeral services held at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Zoner, on Sunday afternoon; interment at Spring Mills. Since the death of her husband, five years ago, when both were residents of Spring Mills, the deceased had made her home with a son seventy-four years. A family of nine or ten children survive.

James Potter Shoop, aged seventy-three years, a veteran of the Civil war, and a brother of Samuel Shoop of this place, died at his home in Canton, Ohio, Tuesday December 21st, of paralysis, after an illness of two weeks. He was born in 1842 in Centre county and was well known here. At the outbreak of the Civil war he enlisted in the three months service and later re-enlisted for the entire war, being for a year and a half personal orderly for General Hancock.

Mrs. Clarissa Jane Morgan, mother of L. Ray Morgan, known to many residents in this place, died at her residence in Phillipsburg Friday preceding Christmas. Mrs. Morgan was one of the oldest residents of Phillipsburg and for the past twenty years or more was totally blind. She bore her affliction with marked patience and while far advanced in years was able to care for herself up until almost the very last.
