DEATH OF A. S. BAILEY.

The death of A. S. Bailey, a former prominent citizen, occurred at the home of his son, George Bailey, in the state of Oregon, February 1st. His son found him cold in death. Armstrong Stewart Bailey was the oldest son of John and Nancy Goheen Bailey and was born in the village that bears his name, Jan. 10, 1838. His young days were spent on the home farm in the Glades. He entered Farm School in the fall of 1860, when only 35 scholars were enrolled. When the call came for troops he enlisted in Co. E, 45th P. V. Regiment and served for four years, participating in seventeen hard fought battles; he was twice wounded and captured and spent eight months in Libby prison. Later he was promoted to 2nd Lieut. He was a descendant of a long line of patriots, one grand-uncle serving in the Revolutionary war and another in the war of 1812. He is survived by his wife, one son and several grandchildren. Also two brothers—G. W. of Kansas, and Warren S., of Illinois—and two sisters—Mrs. D. R. Grazing, of Neffs Mills, and Mary of Kansas City. He was a loyal G. A. R. member; and with the S. of V. and S. W. V. laid him to rest Tuesday, the G. A. R. post being in charge.

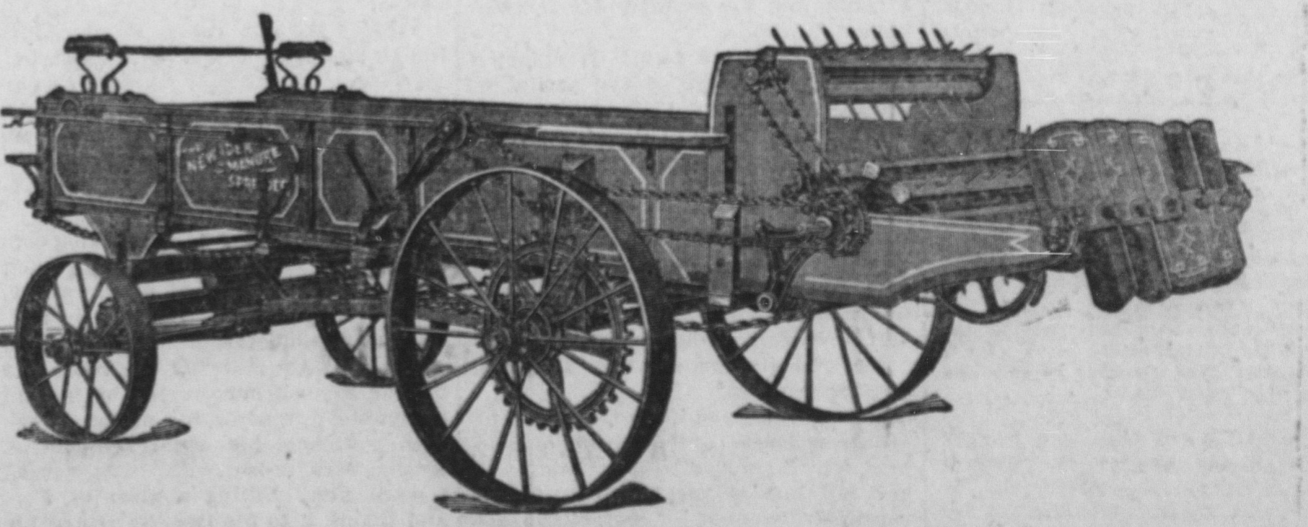
