The newspaper men report for drill at least once a week, and frequently oftener, at Fort Myer, Va., which is just across the Potomac from Washington.

One of the members of the organization has written the story of its inception, its work and its purposes. It is presented herewith.

"The troop was organized in September, 1915, upon the initiative of the newspaper men themselves, and a committee appealed to Secretary of War Garrison to see what assistance he could give. Secretary Garrison was quick to take advantage of the offer of the correspondents, and it was largely through his personal interest that matters were arranged satisfactorily. Every facility has been thrown open to the troops, and while there has been very little advertising of its existence, those in Washington who are close in touch with army affairs are familiar with what is going on and are watching the experiment with interest. Maj. Gen. Hugh Scott, chief of staff and now acting secretary of war, has personally inspected the troop in

its mounted work. "For the three months ending in De cember, 1915, the work of the troop included fifteen hours' dismounted drill and about six hours' pistol target practice, five hours' rifle target practice, two hours' saber drill, four hours' equitation and one-half an hour lecture. Beginning with January 1, 1916, the work was materially increased. The troop reports for duty at Fort Myer at 9:30 on Sunday morning and is dismissed between twelve and one o'clock. This period is devoted to riding, either in the drill hall or out of doors, to gymnasium work and to dismounted drill. On Wednesday evening the troop reports at seven o'clock at an armory in Washington. where it goes through dismounted drill for one hour, followed by an hour and a half or two hours of classroom work in which the elements of mapmaking, strategy and military science
