No Servian girl would feel she could hold up her head in society unless she could speak four languages. There is hardly a Servian woman who cannot play some musical instrument. Embroidery, painting, drawing, and sculpture are all studied. Politics is

a popular feature among women. Servian women are very domesticated and the highest ladies pay personal attention to trivial matters of house keeping.

There are two women doctors practicing in Belgrade, and several wom en teachers. But public opinion, on the whole, is rather against women entering the labor arena.
