HUGHES' ACCEPTANCE SPEECH Too Long, and Vague in Suggesting Alterations for the Policies He Criticizes.



dies are necessary. After irritation has set in, and small red spots appear, the application of a moderately strong solution of ammo nia to the affected parts is recommended by the department of agriculture's

entomologists. A supersaturated solution of bicarbonate of soda, or common cooking sods or saleratus, will afford relief. Liberal applications should be made until the irritation subsides. If the suffering is severe a dilute tincture of lodine or collodion should be lightly applied.


