CUBA WARNED AGAINST WAR

U. S. Will Not Tolerate a Revolution.

COULD GET READY QUICKLY

Lansing Is Scanning Reports Of Spreading Of Revolt Against Menocal—Call For Volunteers By The Cuban Government.

Washington—Reports telling of the spread of the Liberal revolt in Cuba aroused such apprehension that Secretary Lansing cabled a second warning to the people of the republic that the United States would not regard as legal any government set up by violence. The message went to Minister Gonzales, at Havana, and to every American consul, to be circulated all over the island.

Mr. Lansing pointed out the responsibility of the United States in connection with Cuba and intimated very clearly that revolution was not to be tolerated.

Could Get Ready Quickly.

Minister Gonzales' reports of the growth of the revolt were submitted by the State Department to the Secretaries of War and Navy as promptly as they were received. In neither of the military departments was there indication that any warlike move was being prepared in connection with the situation, but because of the experience gained in two previous interventions, military operations could be inaugurated in brief time without much renewed study of plans.

Secretary Baker announced that, with the approval of the President, a deal had been closed yesterday for the sale of 10,000 army rifles and 2,000,000 rounds of ammunition to the Cuban Government. Negotiations for the purchase had been in progress for several months. The President is authorized by statute to approve the sale of arms and ammunition to Cuba, whose soldiers are the only ones in the world other than American who carry the United States Army Springfield rifle. Shipments of the guns and ammunition will be hastened, as they will be needed by President Menocal to arm his volunteers.

Revolt Spreading.

Official news from Cuba convinced the Administration that the rebellion already has assumed greater proportions than has been anticipated. Developments of the movement were reported from widely separated points, and the Cuban Government's call for volunteers served to support the successes claimed by the rebels.

DRY MOVEMENT ADVANCED.

Favorable Report On Submission Of Proposed Amendment.

Washington.—The movement for national prohibition advanced one step further when the House Judiciary Committee presented a report favoring submission to the several States of a constitutional amendment making the United States "dry."

This amendment, which would become effective if approved by the legislatures of two-thirds of the different States, provides that "the sale, manufacture for sale, transportation for sale and importation for sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes in the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof, and exportation thereof, are forever prohibited."

A two-thirds vote of the Senate and House is necessary to submit this amendment to the States.

FOR EXTRA SESSION.

Washington Expects That President Will Reassemble Congress.

Washington.—President Wilson is confidently expected in many quarters to issue within the next two weeks a call for an extra session of Congress to assemble immediately after the present Congress adjourns on March 4. While it is anticipated that the call would be based on the failure of the present Congress to pass the various pending Administration bills, such as railroad strike legislation, food control legislation, the corrupt practices bill and the oil land leasing and the general dam bills, it is regarded as not unlikely that the President might want Congress available after March 4 in the event that it becomes necessary for him to undertake warlike steps against Germany.

DYNAMITE MIXED WITH COAL.

Some Of It Reported To Have Been Found On American Warship.

Norfolk, Va.—Dynamite was reported to have been found mixed with coal on an American naval vessel here and shipments intended for merchant vessels due to sail for Europe. Confirmation of this report was not available from officials of Lambert's Point pier, where most of the Allied merchantmen are lying.

Inspectors who have been watching cargoes destined for Europe are examining all coal before it goes aboard a ship. Pier guards have been troubled and given stringent orders regarding persons who visit the piers.

FAVORS BILL FOR FORCED SERVICE

Measure Brings to a Head Much-discussed Question.

TRAINING FOR SIX MONTHS

Training of 500,000 Boys Annually, Each of Whom Would Be Furloughed into Reserve for Nine Years After Training.

Washington.—The Senate Military Committee reported favorably a bill framed by a subcommittee creating a military and naval citizen reserve force based on universal military training and service.

While the committee report does not indicate any belief that Congress will act on the measure at this session, the bill brings to a definite head the universal service discussion of the last few months and offers a specific plan on which public sentiment can crystallize.

The bill requires six months' training without pay for all youths during their nineteenth year. Exemptions are confined to the members of the regular Army and Navy, those physically unfit, those who are the sole support of dependent relatives and those affiliated with religious creeds which forbid them to bear arms. The latter class, however, are liable for training in the noncombatant branches of the Army.

It is estimated the bill would provide for the training of 500,000 boys annually, each of whom would be furloughed into a reserve for nine years after his training period. With allowances for shrinkage of classes due to various causes as the years pass, this plan would give a total force of 3,165,000 men who had had six months' training, at the end of the first nine year cycle, all subject to call for service only in the event of a "defensive war" on the imminence thereof.

ELECTORAL VOTE CANVASSED.

Congress In Joint Session Declares Wilson and Marshall Re-elected.

Washington.—Congress completed the constitutional formalities carrying into effect the will of the voters expressed last November and officially declared Woodrow Wilson president and Thomas R. Marshall vice-president, re-elected.

At a joint session of the Senate and House the sealed vote was canvassed by States with the usual quadrennial ceremony and the result of the balloting of the electoral college, once the deciding factor in presidential contests, but in recent years only a perfunctory means of ratifying the popular voice, was entered formally on the official records. The count showed 277 votes for Wilson and Marshall and 254 for Hughes and Fairbanks.

13 PERISH IN HOTEL FIRE.

As Many More Injured In Escaping, Others Suffer From Exposure.

Minneapolis.—Thirteen lives are believed to have been lost in a fire which destroyed the Kenwood Hotel here. Bodies of 12 of the victims are believed to be buried in the ice-laden debris of the hostelry. At least a dozen persons were injured. Others are suffering from exposure.

SWISS FEEL NEW BLOCKADE.

Meatless Days and Restricted Menus Employed To Economize.

Berne, Switzerland.—Meatless days, sugar cards, rice cards and restricted hotel menus are being resorted to by the Swiss Government. Foodstuffs are becoming more scarce as a result of the new naval blockade. Measures are being taken to reduce everywhere the use of illuminating gas to save coal.

WHITE HOUSE SEASON ENDS.

President and Wife To Give Dinner To Speaker and Mrs. Clark.

Washington.—The winter social season at the White House officially closed when the President and Mrs. Wilson give a dinner in honor of Speaker Champ Clark and Mrs. Clark. The guests included many of the most prominent members of Congress, several of the Cabinet members and a few outsiders.

AMERICAN RED CROSS LEAVES.

Surgeons and Nurses At Graudenz Follow Gerard's Order.

Berlin.—The American Red Cross contingent of three surgeons and three nurses, which has been on duty in the hospitals of Graudenz, Prussia, for the past two months, received an order from the American Ambassador at Berlin to leave, and departed immediately.

NEWSPAPERS GOING HIGH.

London Times May Raise Its Price To 14 Cents a Copy.

London.—The price of the Times may be raised to 14 cents a copy. The Times sells for 4 cents now, but an editorial announcement stated that, if necessary, the price would be increased to 14 cents, the sum for which it sold prior to 1836.
