The "Unloaded" Gun Kills Wife. The "unloaded" gun has claimed another victim. This time the life of a young mother, aged twenty-two years, was snuffed out when a shot gun, in the hands of her husband, was discharged when he attempted to "break" it preparatory to cleaning it. Mrs. Helen Fox, wife of Henry L. Fox, is the dead woman. The family resided at Altoona where the tragedy occurred last Thursday evening. The full charge of No. 6 shot, discharged at a distance of only eight feet, entered the woman's breast, killing her instantly. Mr. Fox had returned from work and after eating supper, assisted his wife with the dishes, as she was suffering from a slight injury to the hand and he advised her not to put her hands in the dishwasher. Completing the service for his wife he got out his fishing tackle, expecting to go fishing soon. While handling the rods and outfitting clothes, he decided to clean his two shot guns and put them away for the season. His wife cautioned him to be careful of the guns, telling him to hurry and finish the cleaning that he might put them away for good. Mr. Fox had finished cleaning a single-barrel shot gun and picked up the double-barrel weapon. The woman had just finished combing her hair before the kitchen mirror and turned around when the gun exploded. Her husband was seated on a low chair, the two small children Pauline, aged 4, and Louise, aged 2 playing at his side. The father moving one of the children to his rear, and out of the way, lifted the gun to break it at the breach when it exploded with a roar. The woman fell to the floor, blood gushing from her breast, and died almost instantly.

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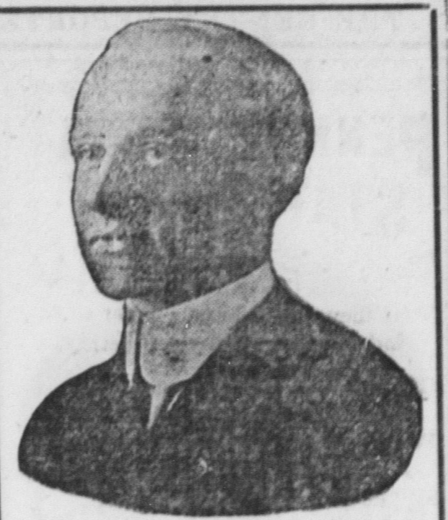

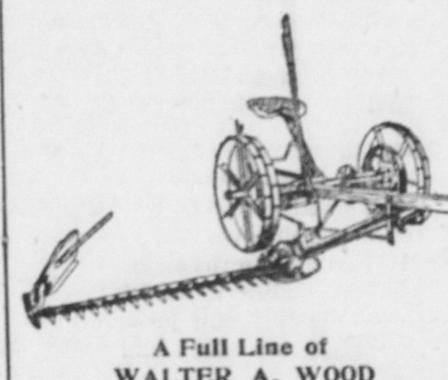
