Stales for handling the flag.

The Stars and Stripes should not be hoisted before sunrise, nor allowed to remain after sunset.

When flown at half-mast as a sign of mourning, it should be hoisted to full staff at the conclusion of the funeral.

On Memorial Day, May 30, the flag should fly at half-mast until noon and at full mast from noon until sunset.

In flying the flag at half-mast, it should be hoisted first to full mast, then lowered to position, the distance of the width of the flag from the top of the staff.

Preliminary to lowering from half-mast, it should be hoisted again to the top.

The flag should never be allowed to touch the ground.

When two flags are displayed the Stars and Stripes should be placed at the right.

When the national flag is passing in parade, and review the spectators should, if walking, halt; if sitting stand, and stand at attention, uncovered.
