## "SKY LINE" LOGGING LATEST

Modern Methods of Western Camps Said to Be Cheaper and More Efficient Than the Old Ways.

In the logging camps of Oregon and Washington a "skyline" method of logging is proving much cheaper and more efficient than the former method of dragging out logs from the forest by a donkey engine and cables operating on the ground, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. The sky-line plan is to run a cable through blocks or pulleys suspended at a great height on giant trees, so as to form a sort of trolley line by which the logs are hoisted into the air and then hauled over the tops of ordinary trees and other obstructions to the rollway, where they are loaded aboard freight cars for shipment.

The donkey engine which operates the skyline has five drums, including two for main lines and two for trip The top cable, from which the log is suspended, is one of the main lines, while the other is used to haul the log. In operation the top cable is lowered with its block, or trolley, directly over the log to be picked up; it is then pulled taut, raising the log with it by means of a "choker," or steel tongs. In the air a log can, of course, be moved much faster than on the ground.

## A Philadelphia Idea.

Music and cleaning the parlor have never been very closely associated. When the housewife wants to play the plano she generally waits until she has cleaned the parlor, taken a bath and dressed herself in party clothes. Now a Philadelphian has patented a dust-filtering attachment which can be attached to the player-plano, and the ordinary housewife can now seat herself at the player-plano, obtain music via the keys, work the pedals for all she is worth and, with her child to run the vacuum cleaner about the floor, she can have it clean in a jiffy. The bellows of the player are attached to the vacuum cleaner by means of a special pipe, and in this manner the needed vacuum is created for cleaning

# PUTS DRY BILL UP TO STATES

Senate Passes the Prohibition Amendment By 65 to 20

SIX YEARS TO TAKE ACTION

The Measure Goes Through Apparently in Order That Senators Might Rid Themselves Of Political Question.

Washington.-A resolution for submission to the states of a prohibition amendment to the Federal Constituion was adopted by the Senate. The vote was 65 to 20, eight more than the necessary two-thirds.

As adopted the resolution contains a provision that the states must be asked to ratify the amendment within six years. The House still must act on the resolution. Senators voting for the resolution

The Senate's action came after three days' debate. All efforts to amend the resolution failed except for the addition of Senator Harding's amendment fixing the six years' time limit within which three-fourths of the states must ratify the amendment to make it effective. This was approved by 56 to 23.

## What Resolution Provides.

As adopted, the resolution, which was submitted by Senator Sheppard, of Texas, Democrat, would add the following article to the Federal Constitution:

The manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof, for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the Legislatures of the several states, as provided in the Constitution, within six years from the date of the submission thereof to the states by the Con-

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Although most of the debate on the resolution had been perfunctory, the usual scenes marking the end of warmly contested legislative fights were re-enacted. Brief, spirited speeches under a 10-minute limit were made to crowded galleries, with the Senate sweltering in one of the hottest of summer days.

May Put Off Dry Vote. Washington .- Notwithstanding radical agitation among certain members of the House for an immediate vote upon the nation-wide prohibition amendment, the outlook favors a postponement of all action on the measure until Congress reassembles in December. Early in the present session the Democratic caucus went on record in favor of taking up this amendment and the one providing for woman suffrage at the regular winter session. The notable growth in the number of enemy war prisoners escaping from Russia since the revolution is engaging the attention of the military authorities. According to published data from the beginning of the war until March a total of 5,350 escapes have been registered, whereas during March 735 managed to get away, in April 2,518 and in May more than 3,000 escaped.

North of Husiatyn, on the Russo-Galician frontier, the Russians restored their position on the East bank of the River Zbrocz, says the official statement by the Russian War Department. Austro-German efforts to force a passage across the Zbrocz in the region of Pukliany and Podlipic were frustrated.

Zaleszik has been evacuated by the Russians under heavy pressure. On the Roumanian front fortified positions on the right bank of the River Putna, northwest of Soveia, were

captured by the Roumanians. An official statement issued says: "According to reports of secret service agents, the present German offensive was undertaken as the result of detailed testimony concerning internal conditions of the Russian Army, to make any statement to the newsof the German chief of staff. Field Marshal von Hindenburg, it appears, had promised Emperor William that in two months he would put Russia out of action."


