### Soldier and Sallor Insurance.

If a soldier or sailor is killed, and he has a wife and children, the Government will provide compensation for the wife, so long as she remains unmarried, and support for the children until they become 18 years of age.

These payments range from \$25 for a widow alone to \$57.50 for a widow and four children. If the man is totally disabled the Government will make a fixed monthly payment to him ranging from \$50 a month, if he is married, to \$75 a month, if he has a wife and three or more children. Should he be so helpless as to require a nurse or attendant he will be given up to \$20 additional. Should be lose both feet, both hands, or both eyes, or be permanently bedridder, he will be paid \$100 a month, whether he is a bachelor
