Farmer Defines "Purebred" & "Thorobred" Editor, Reporter:

All classes of people, and especially

the enterprising farmers, are beginning to realize the importance of mproved live stock of all kinds, from poultry to the best and largest breed of horses, and although much interested, most folks make a mistake in applying the proper term to describe their particular kind and breed of stock to which they refer. According to the State Live Stock Sapitary Board all livestock should be classified as purebred, grade, or nondescript; the purebred, to designate registered or subject to registry; the grade to mean only part full or purebred, and the nondescripts are of such a mixed up nature that even reasonable good judges can scarcely trace their peculiar makeup to any distinct breed; hence we should say we have purebred poultry of whatever | 11013 particular kind it may be, purebred sheep, purebred swine, purebred cattle. and also purebred horses of the several distinct breeds, and in one case only may we say thorobred horses and that is when we speak of the English running race horse used under saddle.

Many folks, even among the better educated class, say that they have thorobred poultry, pige, doge, cattle, and like, which is not the case. They no doubt have purebred stock of the various kinds, but the chances are that not one in a thousand has a thoroughbred English running race horse, and when in our various conversations in reference to good stock we are not speaking of such we should not go to settleme that shelf of our vocabulary to get the word "thoroughbred" as often used out of place even by teachers, auctioneers, printers, and stockmer, but in referring to goed live stock of any kind we should be very particular and use the word "purebred" and then specify which special kind you have reference t

The running borse of England bas been bred true to type for many hundred years and this is why the word "thoroughbred" applies to this special breed of light horses only; hence the word "thoroughbred" is used many thousand times too often and improperly.



FLOUR SUPPLY REPORTS

All Householders Must Report Flour Supply at Once-Card Frinted in Newspapers Must be Used.

All householders in Pennsylvania have been ordered by the United States Food Administration to report the quantity of flour in their possession on a flour supply card issued by the Federal Food Administrator for this County and printed below in this paper. The card will not by ssued in other form than that found printed in the newspapers so that you are affected by the order you must cut out the clipping and mail it o the Federal Food Administrator for your County.

The following statement was issued by Mr. Heinz, Federal Food Adinistrator for Pennsylvania, in commenting on the above rule

"The flour supply card issued by the Food Administration is the first ep in a campaign to dearn how much wheat flour is stored away in the omes. Householders are given the opportunity to report on the flour supply card the number in their households, the amount of wheat flour on and (including whole wheat and graham flour) and the amount they consider their thirty days' requirement. Those who fail to report will un the risk of presecution and the penalty for hearding-\$5000 fine and two years' imprisonment or both. If any persons fail to report, the Food Administration can promise them no leniency, if found guilty of hoarding

"By directing the public to state their flour holdings on the flour suply card the Food Administration is taking the step necessary to prevent possible flour famine. Hoarders hasten famine. If next May, June or July re find ourselves without wheat flour, it will be because thousands of tons re stored away in cellars by unpatriotic householders who banish any con deration of the soldiers in their greed to have their own desire sail ed. The flour supply card is a government action which will meet with e approval of all those who have taken the time to study food conditions broad and who know therefore that food is probably the foremost factor

OFFICIAL HOUSEHOLDER'S FLOUR REPORT

WRITE CAREFULLY.

No householder is permitted to purchase over 49 pounds of wheat flour or to have more than 30 days' supply. Every householder must report imaediately (on this form) to their County Food Administrator. Make report of all wheat flour on hand whether it is excess or not and urge on your neighbors the importance and necessity of making this report prompt-

Number in household......adults,children under 12. Thirty days' requirements (when used with substitutes according to 50-50

agree to hold my excess subject to the order of the United States Food Administration.

Maximum penalty for hoarding is \$5,000.00 fine and two years imprisnment. These blanks will not be distributed. You must fill in your own lank and mail or deliver it to your County Food Administrator. An immodiate report will avoid possibility of search and prosecution. HOWARD HEINZ.
