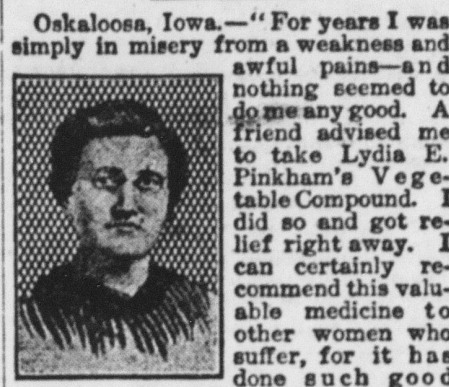

CHANGE IN THE FARMER'S LIFE

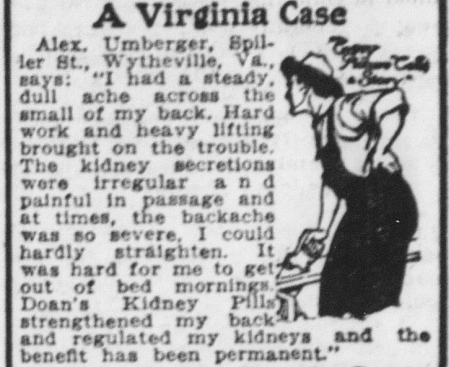
