PENNSYLVANIA STATE ITEMS

Lancaster.—Lancaster county cows have an average milk producing value of \$25 to \$30 a month.

Uniontown.—Her clothing igniting from a gas stove, Mrs. Lida Jane Devore, aged seventy-four, residing at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Samuel J. Maust, a mile before aid could reach her that she died ten minutes later. Mrs. Devore was making her bed when her clothing caught fire from the stove.

Uniontown.—An announcement was made by C. N. McCune, superintendent of the Uniontown schools, that at the request of the war department a radio school, for all of the Union selectives, would be opened shortly. Dewitt Conway will be the instructor and a practical course in wireless will be given the selectives before they leave for camp.

Reading.—Berks county farmers still hold over 300,000 bushels of potatoes, and since March 1 more than 75,000 bushels have been sold.

Reading.—Two thousand seven hundred books contributed during the "Soldier Liberty Drive" in Reading, will be forwarded to the boys at the front.

Reading.—Louis A. Sassaman, an attorney and one of the income tax investigators of Berks county, has been found insane by a commission, his breakdown being ascribed to excessive work.

Ne. Castle.—An unidentified woman aged about fifty, was found dead in the Neshaunock river near the Mill street bridge.

Reading.—Berks county farmers have laid aside 692 bushels of corn for seed. Seven hundred and twenty-five bushels represent a 100 per cent efficiency test, and 427 bushels from 90 to 99 per cent.

Harrisburg.—All but a few rights of way for the state concrete highway between Bangor and Martins Creek have been obtained and bids will soon be advertised, the estimated cost being \$110,000.

Allentown.—Orders have been posted at the Army Ambulance camp directing the soldiers to beware of loan sharks and especially not to fool away their Liberty bonds. Instances have been known where \$103 bonds were hooked for as low as \$50, at rates up to 10 per cent.

Allentown.—The farm bureau of Lehigh county, in a few days, secured 200 men and boys who will work on farms during the entire summer.

Northampton.—The borough schools in which 8 per cent of the children are foreigners, report 100 per cent membership in the Junior Red Cross.

Butler.—While making his first trip in his automobile, which he had owned but one day, Thomas Collins, aged thirty-seven, a farmer near Great Belt, was killed instantly when his car overturned a mile east of Herman.

Butler.—Benah Kennedy, aged ten, daughter of Frank Kennedy, a workman in the factory of the Pittsburgh-Hickson company, in East Butler, died in the Butler hospital from burns received when her clothing caught fire from a man open grate in her home in East Butler.

Lehigh.—Lehigh University now has 742 men in war service.

Pottstown.—The public school teachers who were granted a 10 per cent increase in pay last year, have filed a petition for another raise.

Easton.—Declaring that the letters P-I-G stand for "Patriotism in Garbage," the Easton Rotary club placed itself on record in favor of a municipal pignery.

Allentown.—A number of foreigners became alarmed when flour report cards were delivered at their homes, carried their flour to the river and threw it in.

Boyetown.—Grass fires due to locomotive sparks, set fire to the canning factory and the ore mine buildings, but railroad men and Boy Scouts put out both fires.

New Castle.—Unmarried men cause 75 per cent of the troubles of the police force here, according to figures compiled by the police department. Too much money is the reason given by the police.

Altoona.—Last August Rose McMahon left for duty as a nurse in France and her half-brother William Mulhern, 33 at the station to bid her goodbye. In September William enlisted and in a few months found himself in France, where he met his relative at a base hospital, near the camp where he was in training.

Allentown.—Macingle, Lehigh county had a small prairie fire when several fields caught fire from the sparks of a passing locomotive. While one set of farmers plowed furrows to prevent the flames from spreading, another force beat out the fire, which was threatening several barns and houses.
