DEATHS.

The funeral of Mrs. Owen Johnson, formerly Miss Cecile Denis de Lagarde, the French nurse, took place from the home of her brother-in-law, Captain Theodore Davis Boal, at Boalsburg, on Sunday. Interment was made in the family vault on the Boal estate.

Mrs. Johnson was the wife of the well-known novelist. She was born at Chigene, France, and educated in a convent. She came to this country about twenty years ago with her sister, Mrs. Boal, and her husband. During her residence in this country her time was divided between Boalsburg and Washington. When the European war broke out, she immediately enlisted as a Red Cross nurse and gave her ancestral home at Chambray to the French as a base hospital. Mrs. Johnson's death occurred at the Emergency hospital in Washington, Thursday morning, from complications following the birth of a son, two weeks ago.

A well known trolley conductor and extra dispatcher, Alfred Thomas Lucas, died at the Altoona hospital at 8:40 Saturday morning, of a complication of diseases. He was born at Howard, October 4, 1880, and held membership in the Church of Christ at that place; also in the Junior Order United American Mechanics and in the Modern Woodmen. Surviving are his wife and three children, Louise, Olive and Buddie. Funeral services were held at his late home, 1206 Eighteenth street, at 2 p. m. Tuesday, in charge of Rev. Clayton Grinnell. The cortege went by trolley to Tyrone where interment was made in Grandview cemetery.
