Feen State is First College To Have Boys' Farm Camp.

After ten days intensive work on the college farms, 300 schoolboys from various parts of the State completed their course and were sent out last week to relieve labor situations in agricultural districts. This was the first farm training camp conducted by any college in the country. Another detachment of equal size started a similar course on Monday.

Farmers from all sections have expressed approval of the preliminary instruction given their schoolboy workers. Truck growers in the vicinity of Philadelphia are well pleased with the boys sent to their assistance that they are pleading for additional help trained at the Pennsylvania State College. Many boys were sent directly from the college camp to farms because of the urgent labor need.

Big Fire at Clearfield.

Fire which presumably started in the cloak room on the second floor of the building occupied by the Clearfield Hardware Company, destroyed property to the value of \$50,000 Wednesday night of last week.

Discovery of the blaze was made at about 10.30, and the firemen quickly reached the scene, but the flames had gotten under considerable headway and it was one o'clock before the fire was under control.

One of the firemen was overcome by the smoke and heat and was carried away unconscious. He revived later.

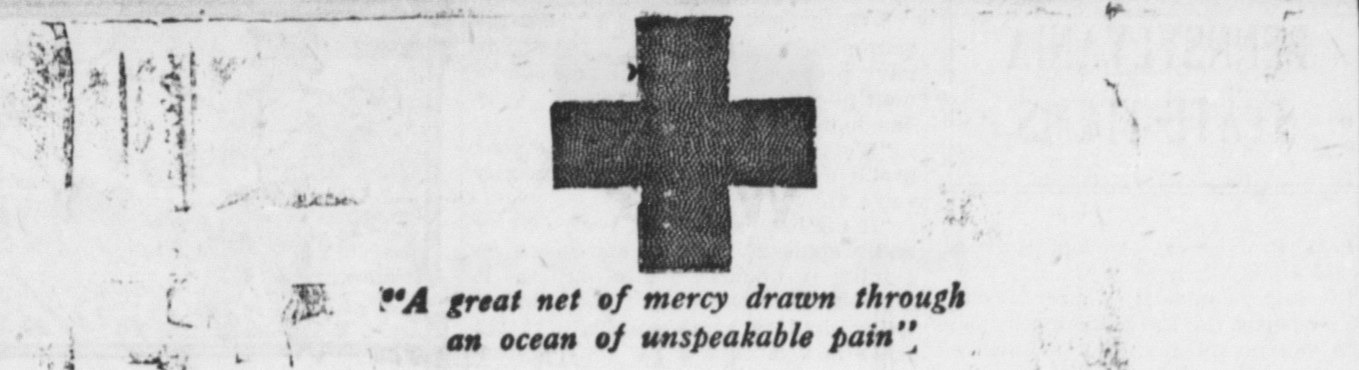

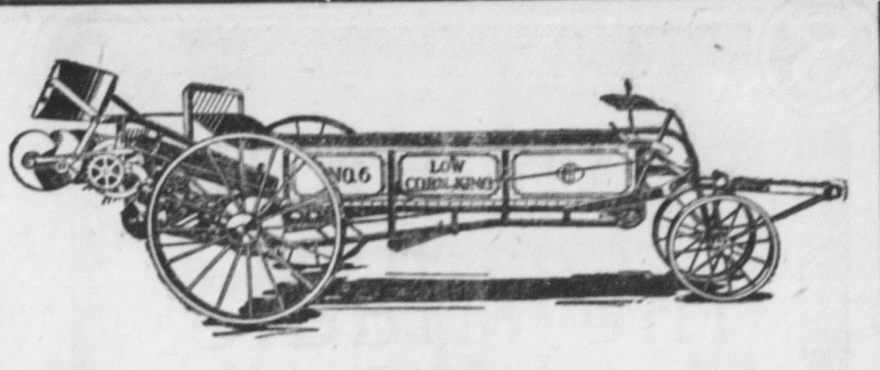
