# GERMAN POWER IS WEAKENING FAST

### General March Says News From All Fronts Is Good.

### 1,750,000 SENT OVERSEES

#### Chief Of Staff Declares Teutons Hurriedly Strengthening New Line Before American Army.

Washington.—Striking proof that the German power is fast crumbling is contained in the announcement by General March, chief of staff, that the news from all battle fronts was "continuously good" and that 1,750,000 American troops have now been embarked for overseas service.

Just six months ago, the enemy flung his full military power against the British lines in Picardy in the great drive that was to end the war in a smashing victory. Today he was fighting desperately to hold the tottering Hindenburg line, the defensive system from which he struck that blow and back into which he has been hurled. Side by side, British, French and American armies have broken definitely the German offensive power in official opinion here. Already the American forces in France are more than half as strong as the whole German army and the tide of American fighting men toward France is continuing at an even pace.

The situation on the various battle fronts was tersely summarized by General March as follows:

"On the Western front our new line in Lorraine was quickly stabilized. The enemy has been hurriedly strengthening his line of defense, the so-called Kriemhild line, which lies only a mile or two in front of our new line on a front of about 20 miles from near Malzeray to the Moselle river at Vandres. We are now 10 miles away from Comfians and 12 miles away from Metz.

"On the plateau northeast of Soissons the French have continued to force back the enemy's troops until they are now within half a mile from the junction of the Mauberge road and the Chemin des Dames, and within 10 miles of Laon.

"The Serbian Army attacked the Bulgarians on a front of 25 miles and drove them back about 20 miles. According to official report the British have reopened activities in Palestine."

The Western battle wall has been rebuilt by the Allied and American forces, according to observers here. When the first American Army swiftly ramped out the St. Mihiel salient the last possibility of a German strategic stroke passed. The enemy faces now a straight line from the North Sea to the Swiss border. There are no salients to give opportunity for flank operations. Even if the power or a counter-offensive should be found—and military authorities here see no chance of that—the German high command would face the costly business of frontal attack. They have nothing, it is pointed out, not a single strategic position, to show for their great drive.

But it is more than a restored offensive line that faces them, officers say. Along the center of the great sweep of the front British and French armies are storming ahead night and day, harrying and harassing the battered German divisions without rest. Pershing's men stand before Metz and Comfians and against that new threat the enemy must gather reserves here in this new front at the very time when every available reserve division sorely needed to meet the Allied rush to the north. Signs of further withdrawal are manifest along wide sectors of the German front.

In payment for their lavish expenditure of lives in the abortive offensive, the German leaders have now been compelled by formal decree to reduce the fighting strength of every infantry unit. Instead of 950 men in each battalion there are now only 850 under the revised organization. In no other way could the drain be met. To military observers this means that every German battalion or company when at full strength, must face an Allied or American unit of the same type that is at least 15 per cent. stronger in fighting men.

There appears good reason to believe that the German losses in prisoners alone since the tide turned against them in July would reach well up toward 200,000 were the truth known. The losses in guns and other material, have not been counted.

With this steadily increasing superiority in both man power and war material at his command, military authorities here feel that perhaps the most striking asset Marshal Poch has acquired in his two months of swift and victorious counter-blows is the power to take the enemy by surprise at will. No longer need he wait for months or even weeks to organize an attack of more than local value. It is now possible almost over night to bring up the men and the mobile artillery for a thrust at any sector. Under the direction of the great French leader the whole front virtually is kept in a constant state of preparation for attack.

# 12TH OF OCTOBER AS LIBERTY DAY

### President Calls People to Celebrate Discovery of America

### AND AID THE WAR LOAN

#### Urges Ardent Rededication To Ideals On Which Nation Was Founded Are Asked To Aid.

Washington.—The President by proclamation named October 12 as Liberty Day and requested the citizens of the United States to celebrate the discovery of America, "in order to stimulate a generous response to the Fourth Liberty Loan."

The proclamation follows:

"Every day the great principles for which we are fighting take fresh hold upon our thought and purpose, and make it clearer what the end must be and what we must do to achieve it. We now know more certainly than we ever knew before why free men brought the great nation and government we love into existence, because it grows clearer and clearer what supreme service it is to be America's privilege to render to the world.

"The anniversary of the discovery of America must, therefore, have for us in this fateful year a peculiar and thrilling significance. We should make it a day of ardent rededication to the ideals upon which our government is founded and by which our present heroic tasks are inspired.

"Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do appoint Saturday, the 12th day of October, 1918, as Liberty Day. On that day I request the citizens of every community of the United States, city, town and countryside, to celebrate the discovery of our country in order to stimulate a generous response to the Fourth Liberty Loan. Commemorative addresses, pageants, harvest home festivals, or other demonstrations should be arranged for in every neighborhood under the general direction of the Secretary of the Treasury and the immediate direction of the Liberty Loan Committee in co-operation with the United States Bureau of Education and the public school authorities."

Let the people's response to the Fourth Liberty Loan express the measure of their devotion to the ideals which have guided the country from its discovery until now and of their determined purpose to defend them and guarantee their triumph.

"For the purpose of participating in Liberty Day celebrations all employees of the Federal Government throughout the country whose services can be spared may be excused on Saturday, the 12th day of October for the entire day."

## THREE FLYERS KILLED.

### Two Fall in Brooklyn Yard When Engine Goes "Dead."

New York.—Lieut. Charles Kinney, Jr., of Covington, Ky., and E. H. Austin, of Boston, were killed when an army airplane from the Mineola aviation field crashed to earth in the Flat bush section of Brooklyn.

Hundreds of persons who saw the machine "go dead" as it was flying low over trees and rooftops and witnessed its plunge into the back yard of a residence. The airplane was demolished. Doctors who were summoned found both occupants dead.

## CUBA'S MAN-POWER.

### Enrollment Expected To Reach About 300,000.

Havana.—Registration of Cuban citizens eligible for the draft under the obligatory military service law passed by Congress, took place Monday. All male citizens between the ages of 21 and 28 inclusive must register. It is estimated the total number will be in the neighborhood of 125,000 men. Later men between the ages of 29 and 45 will be called upon to present themselves for registration. It is believed the combined enrollment will then reach upward of 300,000.

## RUSSIAN WOMAN EXECUTED.

Madame Bedschakajewa, Organizer of Battalion Of Death.  
London.—Madame Alexandra Bedschakajewa, organizer of the Russian Women's Battalion of Death, was executed at Vitebsk, September 12, for participation in a counter-revolution, according to a Berlin wireless dispatch made public here. The dispatch declared the woman was shot.

## WASHINGTON LEADS COUNTRY.

### Draft Registration In That State Was 31 Per Cent. Above.

Washington.—With an enrollment of 31 per cent. more than estimated, Washington state leads the country to date in registration surprises, September 12, the Provost Marshal General announced. Washington registered 192,573 men as compared with the expected enrollment of 146,853.
