Precautions Against Foot and Mouth Disease.

The State Livestock Sanitary Board has sent a general warning to all veterinarians, County Farm Bureau Agents and livestock commission firms advising them of the appearance of the foot and mouth disease in England and asking for close inspection against the introduction of the disease in Pennsylvania.

Dr. T. E. Munce, Acting State Veterinarian says: "The tremendous traffic between this country and England increases the danger of infection being brought here, although Federal officials are taking every precaution to prevent its introduction. It is essential that veterinarians, county agents, stockmen, dealers and others who come in contact with livestock be on the lookout for foot and mouth disease and report promptly all suspicious cases coming under their observation. Cattle, hogs, sheep or goats with sore mouths or feet, should be regarded with suspicion and reported promptly to the nearest agent of the State Livestock Sanitary Board."

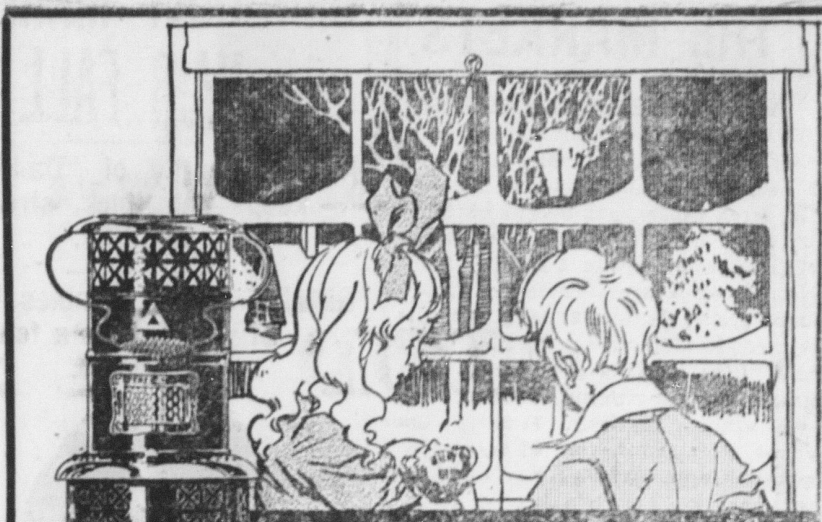

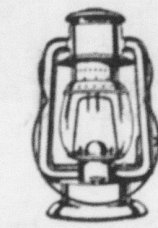
