Duty Devolving on Farmers of This Continent.

Speaking with one of the commissioners appointed to make a survey of the food situation in the battle-torn countries of Europe the writer was told that the depletion and shortage of food was far greater than anybody had expected. With the investigation, which at that time had merely started. much had been brought to light that had only been surmised. Herds of live stock were completely wiped out, fields roots and vegetables were terraced and hummoe'ed by bombs and shells,

Where it is not practical to plow in-But there is another way of getting fested fields, such as ground in clover or alfalfa, they should be thoroughly pests pay for the trouble of killing or disked in the fall or winter and harcatching them. This method consists rowed early in March of the following year. In Indiana clover and alfalfa through an infested field, catching all fields are among the best breeding places for grasshoppers.

The poisoned bait recommended consists of bran or sawdust made tasty and attractive by the addition of molasses and fruit and treated with an arsenical poison. The following formula is recommended: Bran (half-and-half bran and hard-

wood sawdust, or sawdust alone), 25 pounds; paris green or crude arsenious oxide, one pound, or white arsenic, 11/2 pounds; molasses (cheap feeding

grade), two quarts; lemons, bananas or oranges, six fruits, or one ounce of cheap lemon extract; water, about two

'The poison should be thoroughly mixed with the bran. The water, molasses and finely chopped fruit or extract are then mixed and added. The mixture should be wet so that it molds
