INCOME TAX DUE.

Return Must Be Filed On Or Before March 15.-Bill Provides Heavy Penalties.

Work on the collection of \$6,000,000,-000 has been begun by the Bureau of Internal Revenue. This is the estimated yield of the new revenue bill. The income tax provisions of the act reach the pocket-book of every single person in the United States whose net'income for 1918 was \$1,000, or more, and every married person whose net income was \$2,-000 or more. Persons whose net income equalled or exceeded these amounts, according to their marital status, must file a return of income with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which they live on or before March 15, Here is what will happen to them if they don't : for failure to file a return on time, a fine of not more than \$1,000 and an additional assessment of 25 per cent of the amount of tax due.

For "willfully refusing " to make a return on time, a fine not exceeding \$10,-000, or not exceeding one year's impris onment, or both.

For making a false or fraudulent return, a fine of not more than \$10,000, or imprisonment for not more than one year, or both, together with an addition-

For failure to pay the tax on time, a fine of not more than \$1,000 and an additerest for each full month during which t remains unpaid.

In addition to the \$1,000 and \$2,000 personal exemptions, taxpayers are alowed an exemption of \$200 for each person dependent upon them for chief support if such person is under eighteen years of age and incapable of sel'upport. Under the 1917 act, this exmption was allowed only for each de--one who supports one or more persons closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage, or by adoption-is entitled to all exempions allowed a married person.


The normal rate of tax under the new act is 6 per cent. of the first \$4,000 of net income above the exemptions, and 12 per cent, of the net income in excess of \$4,000. Incomes in excess of \$5,000 are subject also to a surtax ranging from I per cent. of the amount of the net income between \$5,000 and \$6,000 to 65 per cent. of the net income above .000,000,18

Payment of the tax may be made in full at the time of filing return or in four installments, on or before March 15, on ber 15, on or before December 15. Revenue officers will visit every

county in the United States to aid taxpayers in making out their returns.






