# NO AIRSHIPS IN FUTURE WARS

### Provision Decided on By Supreme War Council

## THE TERMS FOR GERMANY

### No More To Be Built Until Peace Comes—Greek Claim On Thrace Presented—Armenians Reject Turkish Rule.

Paris.—Germany must deliver all airplanes to the Allies and must prohibit the construction of other airplanes until the conclusion of peace, the Supreme War Council decided in adopting the aerial terms to be imposed on Germany in the preliminary peace. The terms do not decide the future fate of the airplanes, which may either be destroyed or divided among the Allies.

The British and American delegates brought up the question of a distinction between commercial aerial navigation, which will be authorized for Germany after conclusion of peace under certain guarantees, and military aerial navigation, which will be prohibited. The council decided to send an aeronautic commission to Germany to investigate the question of commercial aerial navigation. Deputy Aubigny, of the French Chamber, will be chairman.

All forms of military airplanes are barred to Germany, the only exception being the temporary use until October 1 of 100 hydroaeroplanes and 1,000 men in gathering mines in the North Sea.

There is a divergence in the views of the members of the commission investigating the responsibility for the war on several important points, according to the Temps. As to whether the former German Emperor and other heads of enemy states should be brought to trial is a question on which a division of opinion exists, while the matter of an international tribunal or military tribunals for judging those charged with violations of the rights of nations during the war has not been settled.

The American delegates have opposed an international tribunal, pointing out that the United States was not a belligerent during the whole period when such violations were committed. A possible solution has been under consideration—the appointment of military tribunals composed of officers of different nationalities.

## SLEEPING SICKNESS.

### First Death From The Disease In New York.

New York.—The first death in this city from "sleeping sickness" was reported to the Health Department. Erskine W. Martin, a clerk, 35 years of age, became ill five days ago, went to sleep a day later, and remained in a state of coma until he died, according to the attending physician. Health Commissioner Copeland, declaring only 18 cases of the malady had been reported in Europe and three others in this country, of which two had been fatal said there was no cause for alarm. The symptoms, he added, were sore throat, headache and drowsiness, but these, in a mild degree, might also be accompanied of spring fever.

Dr. Copeland explained that the disease, known as encephalitis lethargica or epidemic coma, should not be confused with sleeping sickness, which is limited to tropical Africa and is transmitted by the tsetse fly.

He said there are eight suspected cases in New York, all in private homes.

## U. S. USED 1,000 \$1-YEAR MEN.

### Revenue Bureau Rules Income Tax Must Be Paid On This Salary.

Washington.—During the war the Government accepted the services of nearly 1,000 men and paid them the nominal compensation of \$1 a year. The dollar became a tax issue today through a ruling of the Internal Revenue Bureau that not only must the dollar be reported, but that it is taxable if the total income from all sources is in excess of the usual exemptions. Most dollar-a-year men had private sources of income above \$6,000, and in these cases the normal tax on the dollar will be 12 cents, or nearly two months' pay at the Government rate.

## NEARLY A MILLION MEN.

### Strength Of British Armies In Occupied Region.

London.—The government announced in the House of Commons that the total strength of effective and non-effective British troops in the armies of occupation in all the theatres of the war amounts to 992,000 men, including officers. The strength of the British Army in France, Belgium and Germany, including Dominion troops, on February 15, was 1,224,166.



## VICTORY LOAN DRIVE APRIL 27

### Campaign Will Last Three Weeks, Says Glass

## MATURE WITHIN FIVE YEARS

### Interest Rate To Be Decided Shortly Before Selling Begins—\$5,000,000,000 Expected Amount

Washington.—The Victory Liberty Loan campaign will open Monday, April 21, and close three weeks later, Saturday, May 10.

Secretary Glass announced the dates, together with the fact that short term notes maturing in not over five years would be issued instead of longer term bonds. The amount of notes to be offered was not disclosed, but it has been generally understood that the loan would be for a minimum of \$5,000,000,000 with the treasury reserving the right to accept all oversubscriptions.

After studying financial conditions in all parts of the country," said Mr. Glass, "I have determined that the interests of the United States will best be served at this time by the issuance of short-term notes rather than of longer term bonds, which would have to bear the limited rate of interest of 4 1/2 per cent.

## Short-Term Notes.

"The Victory Liberty Loan will, therefore, take the form of notes of the United States maturing in not over five years from the date of issue. These notes will be, as were the Liberty Loan bonds, the direct promise to pay of the United States, will be issued both in registered and coupon form, and the coupon notes will be in final form and will have attached the interest coupons covering the entire life of the notes. I am hopeful that the notes in final engraved form will be ready for delivery by the opening of the campaign on April 21.

"I am led to adopt the plan of issuing short-term notes rather than long-term bonds largely because of the fact that I believe that a short-term issue will maintain a price at about par after the campaign is concluded far more readily than would a longer term issue.

"I have not yet reached a conclusion as to the rate of interest and exemptions from taxation which those notes will bear because this decision must be based on existing conditions immediately prior to the opening of the campaign.

## Intensive Campaign.

"I take this opportunity to repeat what I have already stated, that it is the intention of the Treasury Department to carry on the same kind of intensive campaign for distribution as heretofore. It would be a most unfortunate occurrence if the people of the United States failed to take these notes, thus placing the burden of subscriptions on the banks. The business of the country looks to the banking system for credit wherewith to carry on its operations, and if this credit is absorbed to a large extent by the purchase of government securities there will be many limitations placed upon the supply of credit for business purposes. Our merchants and manufacturers need ample credit for setting the wheels of industry in motion for peace-time production and distribution, and the wage-earner is directly interested in seeing that these wheels are kept moving at a normal rate in order that full employment at good wages may continue and where readjustment conditions have necessitated a slowing down of industry it is vitally important that activity be resumed and labor re-employed at the earliest possible moment.

"I, therefore, ask the American people once again to give their support to their government in order that this great loan may be made an overwhelming success by the widest

## DRAFT OF TREATY ALMOST READY

### Germans Will Get It Before the End of the Month

## PUTS END TO CONSCRIPTION

### Present Purpose Is To Call The German Delegates To Versailles Between The 22d And 25th Of March.

London.—Premier Lloyd George and Foreign Secretary Balfour have sent word to their colleagues here, that the Peace Conference has nearly completed its work. The draft of the peace treaty already has been finished and will be signed before the end of March.

When the Germans are summoned to Paris, the treaty will be read to them and they will be invited to sign it. There will be no discussion with a view to alterations of the principal articles of the treaty. If it is thought necessary, questions involving the adjustment of details will be referred to a special commission.

## ON PAR WITH SWISS.

Paris.—Military Germany will go out of existence as the result of the adoption by the Supreme Council of the military terms of German disarmament as they will go into the peace treaty. These terms provide for a sweeping reduction of the German military establishment down to 100,000 men with 4,000 officers, the army to be recruited by the voluntary system for the period of twelve years. The effect of this is to limit Germany's military strength to less than the number of men Switzerland has in her army.

Marshal Foch favored the change, as the conscription plan providing for 200,000 men serving one year terms would have given Germany a trained army of 2,000,000 men in ten years.

As against this Mr. Lloyd George proposed to fix the enlistment term at twelve years. Marshal Foch embodied this in his report, which proposed an army of 140,000 men, but the council finally adopted an amendment further reducing this figure to 100,000.

The progress that has been made with the work of forming the peace treaty ensures the completion of the task by March 20. It is the present purpose of the Peace Conference to call the Germans to Versailles soon after March 20, probably from March 22 to March 25. The document then will be delivered to the German delegates and in case they are not prepared to sign it at once they will be given the opportunity to return to Germany to consider it and return for the formal signing at Versailles.

## VASSAR GIRLS TO VERDUN.

### To Take Charge Of Relief Of Returning Refugees.

New York.—Seven young women sent to France as a Red Cross unit organized by Vassar College, have been designated by the French Government to take charge of relief work at Verdun. They will begin Saturday the relief of refugees who have been forbidden until now to return to the desolate district which was the scene of such desperate fighting.

## NEW RULING ON INCOME.

### Applies To Persons Who Married During 1918.

Washington.—Persons who married or had children during 1918, or who lost dependents through death, are affected by a new ruling by the Internal Revenue Bureau to the effect that the family status on the last day of the year should determine the personal exemption. Under the previous rule, a person was entitled to exemption for only the part of the year in which he had

# FOR BATTLESHIPS OF NEW TYPE

### Battle Cruiser Program of American Navy May Go

## EXPERTS TO MAKE REPORT

### Secretary Daniels And His Chief Technical Advisers Going Abroad In Search Of Information On The Subject.

Washington.—Possibility that the whole battle cruiser program of the Navy, involving an expenditure of nearly a half billion dollars, will be abandoned in favor of a new type of cruiser battleship was indicated by an announcement that Secretary Daniels had ordered suspension of work on the six 35-knot cruisers already authorized until a decision as to the future type of capital ship could be reached.

There is a wide difference of opinion among American naval officers as to whether the slow battleship and the fast cruiser should not give way in the future to a ship combining the power of the one and nearly the speed of the other, and because of this fact congressional committees have deferred action on six additional cruisers until a full report on new types can be made by the department.

It is to gather information for this report that Secretary Daniels and his three chief technical advisers will sail Saturday for Europe. They will be met overseas by Admiral Benson, chief of operations, and Vice Admiral Sims, and upon their return some weeks before Congress meets in extra session, probably in the early summer, a general conference will be held at which a majority opinion of experienced officers will be worked out as to what types of capital ships should be built.

This statement was authorized by Secretary Daniels:

"The conclusion relating to the type of capital ships resulting from a close study of naval activities of the present war has created such a difference of opinion among naval experts that the Secretary of the Navy has directed the temporary suspension of the building of the large battle cruisers.

"Admiral Mayo, the commander-in-chief of the United States Atlantic fleet, when before the Committee on Naval Affairs of the House, stated that, in his opinion, the most effective capital ship of today is a high-speed battleship which carries the great gun power and the armor protection of a battleship, and much as possible of the high speed of a battle cruiser. Such naval experts as Admiral Benson and Admiral Sims, as a result of their observations and study abroad, concur in the opinion of Admiral Mayo. Many of the high ranking officers of the Navy Department likewise concur in this opinion, while many of the experts of the General Board are of the opinion that the battle cruiser as planned should be proceeded with as battleships of slower speed, greater gun power and greater protection be likewise constructed.

"Because of the difference of opinion among naval experts, the large amount of money involved (between \$180,000,000 and \$200,000,000), and the great question of fighting efficiency being involved, the Secretary of the Navy has directed temporary suspension of the construction of the battle cruisers. Little of the work on the hull has been done.

Some of the electrical machinery has been started, but it is not contemplated that the delay of two months or so will be such as to seriously interfere with the proper decision in the matter. It is because of the difference of opinion among experts and to study naval lessons taught by the war that the Secretary of the Navy is taking the chiefs of the technical bureaus of the Navy Department with him to Europe to study the question with naval experts and obtain such other technical information as is possible while abroad from studies of foreign plans and specifications."
