State Agricultural Notes.

Clean pens and clean hog lots are essential to profitable pork production.

Preparations are being made to scout for the European Potato Wart in bituminous coal regions.

Joint worm has taken heavy toll in Pennsylvania wheat fields this year. Plow under or burn all stubble on infested fields to prevent further damage.

The custom of using as seed potatoes left from the previous season's crop, after having disposed of the best, must be discontinued if the present quality and yield of the crop is to be improved. Select seed potatoes when the crop is harvested.

The house-fly will go from an open privy vault, a garbage can, a decaying animal, a consumptive's spittoon, or other filthy thing, direct to your dining table and wipe its filthy feet on your food. The only good fly is a dead fly.

Corn is growing rapidly and looks promising. Yield of early potatoes rather light, but late crop promises much better. Pastures and meadows are in good condition. Fall plowing is in progress.
