January 14, 1885.  
Meyer, our landlord, now runs a hack to the trains.

Grove & Wolf have been awarded the contract for building the new mill at the railroad station.

Ground has been broken for Bartholomew's store, dwelling and stable out at the depot.

Wm. Pealer has been appointed post-master at Spring Mills.

Centre Hall water works are to be partly reconstructed by enlarging the upper half of route to treble the capacity of present main, and to extend the route to the railroad. Work will begin at once.

Aaron Thomas has taken the job of moving the "Felmee" house from the corner down to Spangler's lot on East Church street and putting it safely over cellar and wall. The vacant site will be used for the new Lutheran church.

Samuel Long has begun work on his new summer hotel at the cave. The main building will be 50 x 30 feet and three stories high. A. P. Luse has the contract for the work.

James Potter, of the firm of Harris & Co., Bellefonte, had a leg broken above the knee, at noon today, at the Centre Hall station. He in company with Mr. Wolf was thrown from a buggy, the horse having scared at the train.

**R. B. Taylor Forced into Bankruptcy.**

R. B. Taylor, of Bellefonte, better known as "Bert," went into bankruptcy recently. Creditors on his State road operations forced the issue. At this writing it is not known what his assets or liabilities will show up, but an appraisalment will be made in the near future. It is said that he took road contracts too low; which, coupled with labor trouble, put him on the wrong side of the financial ledger.

**Predicts Long, Cold Winter.**

A half breed Indian residing in New York State, who has attained considerable reputation as a successful weather prognosticator, predicts a long, cold and snowless winter, with early frosts. He bases his predictions on various natural signs to be observed in studying the habits of wild animals and the condition of vegetation, which shows evidence of preparing to meet the unusual severe winter.

**Hoover Claims Food Prices Will Soon Drop.**

A tremendous drop in food prices in the United States may be expected within the next few months, Herbert Hoover declared last week in continuing his testimony before the Congressional committee investigating war expenditures in France.

Hoover said that food speculators in the United States had reached the end of their powers and were no longer able to maintain corners in stocks owing to the inability of Europe to purchase America's over production.

He said that warehouses in many European cities are now full of American foodstuffs but that no outlet exists as the countries needing the food are unable to pay the prices asked for it.

**Prepare the Soil Well Before Seeding.**

As the time approaches to sow winter grains, it may not be amiss to remind the farmers, says Secretary Rasmussen, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, that it is largely a waste of time and money to sow ground in grain where a good seed bed has not been prepared.

It is an old saying that well begun is half done. The farmer should remember that every clod is a piece of soil locked up. No plant root will grow into a clod. Pulverization is fertilization. Clods must be broken up to make the plant food in them available. This principle applies to all crops, but more particularly where grass seed is sown.

Farmers are naturally anxious to increase production. To obtain this result,


