January 28, 1885.

Mr. Leech, of Harris, has purchased Joseph Crozier's farm, west of Centre Hall.

The roller mill is progressing. Timbers for the frame work are on the ground and carpenters are at work.

Howard Rishel, son of John Rishel, of this place, who has spent the last four years in Illinois, is home on a visit.

The channel of Penns creek will be changed near Gentzels, in Gregg township, by the railroad company, so as to avoid two railroad bridges.

J. B. Spangler, of near Tusseyville, has returned from a five weeks' trip to Missouri and Kansas.

The railroad station was completed and occupied for business last week. Mr. Ginter, of Sunbury, is the agent. He is an experienced agent and will add a good citizen to our place.

Can't Get Rid of \$2,800 Job.

Edward Baker, postmaster at Shamokin, finds he has a job he cannot get rid of, and strange as it may seem, it's the \$2,800 place of postmaster. More than a year ago Baker resigned, and a civil service examination was held to get a successor. Yet the authorities at Washington have seen fit not to accept Baker's resignation, as yet.

Baker is also an assistant district attorney of Northumberland county, and a successful lawyer. At Tuesday's primaries he was given the Democratic nomination for district attorney without opposition.

Now he has asked the postoffice department to relieve his bondsmen. He wants to resign and devote his time to other interests.

Farmers who desire to qualify themselves to furnish the information required by the fourteenth Census, which will be taken on January 1 next, will do well to write the Census Bureau, of Washington, D. C., and ask for a copy of the farm schedule.

When bread has moulded in a bread box the spores of the mould fungus are scattered about the interior, and will readily cause mould in a fresh loaf placed there. To prevent this wash the interior well with about a spoonful of formaldehyde (40 per cent strong) in a cup of water and then air in the sun for an hour.

Corn cutting is in progress in Pennsylvania with good yield assured, and most of crop out of reach of danger from frost. Wheat and rye seeding are now well under way. Potatoes will approximate an average crop. Meadows and fall pasture are in good condition.

HELPED UNCLE SAM RAISE ONE BILLION

War Savings Chief Retires But Will Unofficially Aid Thrift Movement.

After two years of active service in the great war financing campaigns of the government, during which he assisted in the raising of hundreds of millions of dollars, E. McLain Watters, Director of the War Savings Division, Third Federal Reserve District, has resigned to resume private business. The resignation is effective from September 15th.

Mr. Watters' retirement as director does not mean, however, that he will discontinue his interest in the government thrift movement. The organization built up by him will continue the work under supervision of Governor E. Pusey Passmore, with Mr. Watters acting in an advisory capacity.

This organization, which is almost entirely a volunteer one, with chairmen and women, vice chairmen in the various counties, has been doing splendid work in encouraging the thrift spirit and promoting sales of millions of dollars' worth of small government securities.

Mr. Watters was successively Associate Sales Director of Treasury Certificates of Indebtedness, Chairman of the Advisory Committee for Pennsylvania, Victory Loan Committee, and War Savings Director.

During Mr. Watters' term as Associate Sales Director, a total of approximately one billion dollars was raised in the Third District by sales of Certificates, which were in the nature of short term loans, enabling the government to pursue its war policies unhampered by financial considerations.

As Advisory Committee Chairman

for Pennsylvania during the Victory Loan drive, Mr. Watters reorganized the state plan of campaign. He advocated the "home rule" system by which each county was entrusted with the conduct of its own loan campaigning. Mr. Watters toured the state in support of the loan and contributed such energetic leadership that the Pennsylvania section led all other divisions of the Third Federal Reserve District in oversubscription of the loan. Every district of the state, with two minor exceptions in which there were unfavorable labor conditions, exceeded the loan quota allotted to it. Under Mr. Watters' direction the state for the first time in the loan campaigns led Philadelphia in actual amount of oversubscriptions. Almost \$22,000,000 worth of bonds were sold in excess of the quota of \$145,000,000.

In addition to conducting the State Victory Loan Campaign, Mr. Watters directed the War Savings activities of the entire Third Federal Reserve District, which includes 48 Pennsylvania counties, 9 New Jersey counties and all of Delaware. He took charge in January, 1919, and due to the methods employed by him, public interest in Thrift and War Savings Stamps was maintained despite the overshadowing competition of the Victory Loan drive. Sales were encouraged all during the loan drive and have been steadily increasing.

Mr. Watters opposed spectacular methods of sale of small government securities and worked for their distribution through public demand based on a desire to own and hold the securities for their legitimate investment worth. He conducted a combined educational and sales campaign, with the result that redemptions of 1919 Stamps in the Third District have been held down to a very low percentage of the many millions of dollars worth sold.

Mr. Watters was frequently called to national headquarters in an advisory capacity while serving as War Savings Director.

War Bombs as Savings Banks.

More than 300 banks and trust companies in the Third Federal Reserve District, which includes 48 Pennsylvania and 9 New Jersey counties and all of Delaware, are aiding the government Savings Division in the distribution of hand grenade savings banks. These savings banks are highly desirable war souvenirs and are given free to supporters of the government thrift plan.

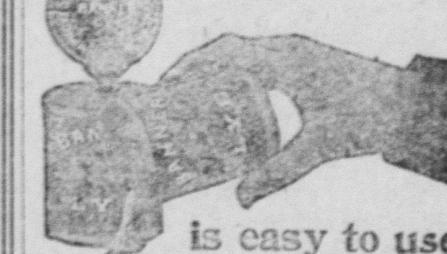
