Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1885.

April 8, 1885.

Wes Honney is adding an improvement to Church street by erecting a coach shop.

Dr. Alexander sold his land, ten acres, near this place, to Howard Homan of Aaronsburg, for \$1200. Mr. Homan intends erecting buildings on the ground.

The Centre Hall toll-gate is to be moved to the woods on the south side of the railroad.

The lots in the vicinity of the station are dotted with timber and stone piles—an indication of a little boom for this spring and summer in building and business operations.

Daniel Geiss, of Joliet, Ill., was here on a visit last week.

The new Lutheran church at Madisonburg will be dedicated on Sunday, April 14th. Rev. Dr. Conrad, of Philadelphia, will perform the dedicatory services.

Married.—March 26 in Centre Hall, by Rev. W. E. Fischer, Wm. H. Homan, of Farmers Mills, and Ida M. Musser, of Aaronsburg.

W. A. McClellan, of Tusseyville, left for Joliet, Ill., on Tuesday.

The running of the train has been changed in such a way as to make the road of no convenience to parties of Miles, Penn, Haines and Gregg, who want to go to and from Bellefonte.

Heretofore close connections were had at Centre Hall with stages in all directions—now such passengers will have to go entirely by private conveyance or lay over one night at Spring Mills and then one night at Centre Hall. Besides this, it throws the mails back seven hours.

Great Movie Picture to Aid in Armenian Relief.

"Out of the Land of Sorrows" is the title of a soul-stirring moving picture that will be shown in the Lyric Theatre in Bellefonte Thursday evening, January 22, at 8 o'clock. This film will depict upon the screen the story of the anguish and destitution that is prevalent in the Near East, and will give first-hand, undisputed evidence of the reign of terror that the blood-thirsty Turk has spread among the christian people of Armenia, but the picture is without many of gruesome features that have characterized movies of a similar type.

Dr. Lincoln Wirt, minister and author, was sent out in January, 1919, by the American Committee for Armenian Relief to make a survey of the conditions in Turkey, Syria, and Palestine. He was accompanied by G. R. Carrier, a motion picture photographer. They took 20,000 feet of film and 700 still pictures.

Some of the pictures were taken from an aeroplane flying 200 miles across Palestine, while thousands of feet were ground out from a platform lashed in front of a locomotive as their train passed thru the Taurus mountain ranges. As they plunged into tunnel after tunnel—thirty-two in the course of thirty miles and at an elevation of 5000 feet—the camera recorded mile after mile of mountain scenery as grand as any to be found in the Alps or the Rockies.

The film will show the capture by the British of Ishmel Haki Bay who was responsible for the deportation of 40,000 Armenians. Many of the cities of near east where massacres and slaughters took place will be portrayed on the screen, while photographs will be shown of the starving inmates of the refugee city of Damascus. Palestine is viewed from an airplane and visits are made to the sea of Galilee and to the Lebanon mountains.

Dr. Wirt who made the tour of the near east and who assisted the photographer will accompany the picture and will lecture as the film is shown upon the screen. This exhibition is under the direction of the Near East Relief in Centre county, and the proceeds will go toward the county apportionment of \$7720. The place is the Lyric Theatre. The time is Thursday evening, Jan. 22, at 8 o'clock. The admission is 25 cents. Matinee 2:15 Thursday. Children ten cents.

Hog Cholera Control.

Hog cholera cost the farmers of Pennsylvania approximately \$25,000 last year. With the strict observance of proper sanitary methods, much of this loss could have been saved.

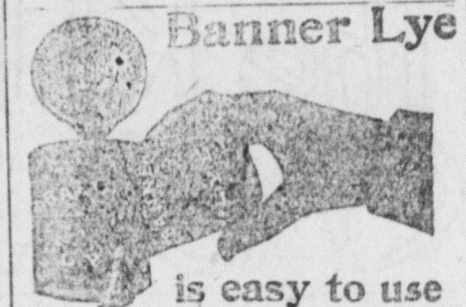
During the months that the quarantine was in effect in eleven counties in the state, there was a strict observance of the regulations of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture and the cholera was practically stamped out. On January 15, the quarantine is lifted, but the same regulations that stamped out the disease in these counties, became effective in the entire state, save that permits will no longer be required for intra-state shipment of hogs. With the co-operation of the farmers in observing the regulations, and a prompt use of serum where the malady makes its appearance, the loss from cholera during 1920 can be materially reduced.

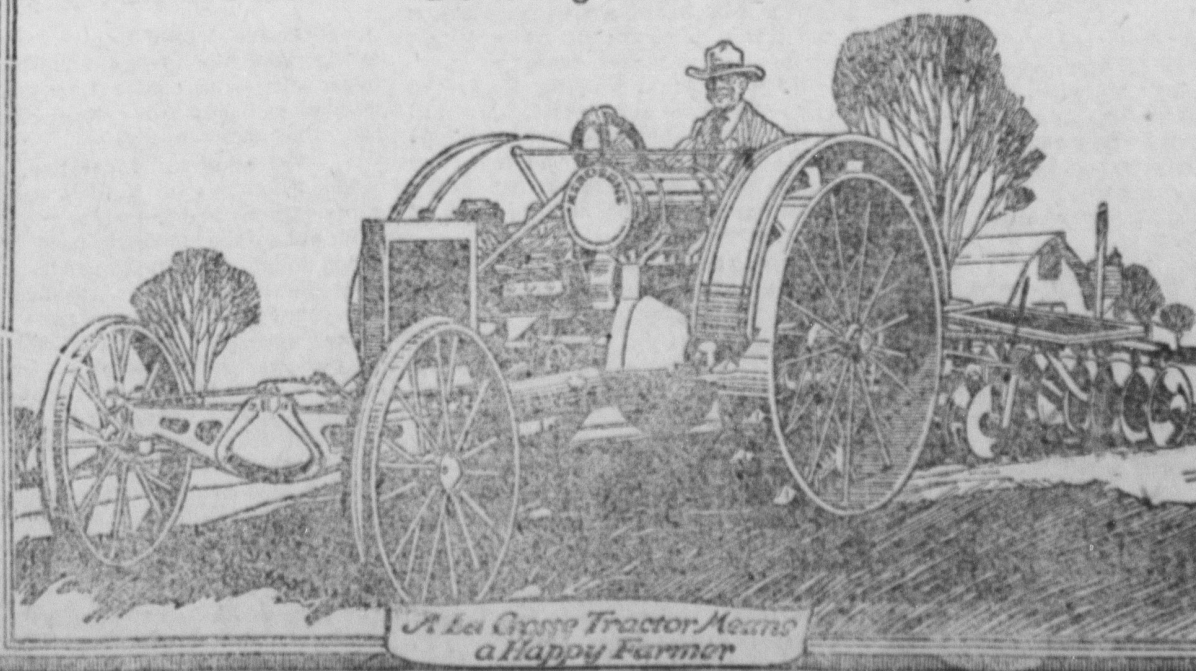
