**THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO**

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1885.

June 17, 1885  
Mrs. Sellers, wife of Squire Sellers, of Oak Hall, died last week.

The Evangelical parsonage is up and being rapidly pushed to completion.

Daniel Corman is building a large store-house at Oak Hall, and will open a store there when the building is completed.

John A. Kline dumped the first load of wheat—80 bushels—into the elevators of the new rolling mill. Joshua Potter was next.

Millheim now reports a hook and ladder company.

Some corn fields have been nearly entirely ruined by the cut-worms.

The farm of J. Henry Keller, who moved to Kansas last spring, was knocked off at sheriff's sale to Mr. McNitt, of Mifflin county, for \$11,500. The farm is one-half mile west of Centre Hall.

A large audience attended the installation of Rev. Land, on last Sunday evening, in the Reformed church.

Hoffer street is soon to be opened. It is one of the new street leading from Church street to the station.

Wm. Moyer, a few days ago, took out a stump near the reservoir, and shouldering it, proceeded to his home nearby to make kindling of the stump. Before he had gone very far he felt there was something alive inside, and thinking it might be a ground squirrel, he threw the stump on the ground, when out tumbled a 4 1/2 ft. black snake. There was one less snake shortly after.

A party having ponies from the Indian territory was here, and sold two of them to Dr. Alexander on Monday. The animals had halters put on them for the first time and were put into a stable. Next morning one of them was found dead, having hung itself.

**World's Smallest Baby.**

New York, the world's largest city, is claiming the world's smallest baby.

The child in question is Jeanne Ousset, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Ousset, and her weight at birth was exactly half a pound. Although nearly a month old, the tiny miss still fails to tip the scales at an even pound.

Miss Louise Bernard, the nurse who cares for Jeanne, declares the child is normal in every way and predicts that it shortly will begin to gain weight at a tremendous rate.

The wee girl is one of twins who were born on February 24. The other twin, a boy, weighed three-quarters of a pound, but died soon after it was born.

Physicians and specialists have expressed amazement over the case and declare the child to be without doubt the smallest infant ever born who has survived.
