

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

Paragraphs of News Taken from the Files of the Reporter of 1885.

June 24, 1885.  
Only three-fourths of a mile of track to lay yet to complete between Bellefonte and Lemont, but the iron has run out, and when a new supply comes on, the little gap will be finished.

Jack Roush, a native of Haines township and a former landlord of the Rebersburg hotel, committed suicide last week at his home, the "Narrows Hotel", near Laurelton, by taking laudanum.

July 8, 1885.—The railroad between Lemont and Bellefonte is finished now. Emanuel Smith has been appointed postmaster at Potters Mills.

Chas. Bollinger has been appointed constable for Potter township, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John Weaver.

Messrs. Noll and Stewart, of Pleasant Gap, are now doing the main part of the mason work for the Centre Hall Lutheran church.

The hotel at Lemont was destroyed by fire on the night of June 22. The building was occupied by Isaac Armstrong, who lost all his furniture but had insurance on same. Mrs. Armstrong had near \$600 under her pillow which burned. The house belonged to John Thompson, who has about \$600 insurance in the Penns Valley company.

Married.—On June 18, in Centre Hall, by Rev. G. W. Currie, A. C. Ripka, of near Centre Hall, and Miss Amelia V. Daup, of Potters Bank.

Died.—At Centre Hall, June 21, Mrs. Clara Tobias, aged 77 years, 2 months, 12 days.

Items from the Millheim Journal.

Miss Jennie Kessler, who has spent the past year in Cleveland, O., arrived at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Kessler, last Thursday morning.

A. M. Yearick, of Woodward, recently sold his home in that place to Mrs. Thomas Vonada, for \$2,500. The sale includes several building lots and eight acres of farm land.

Ill luck befell James Tressler, of near Coburn, on last Thursday forenoon when a horse, which he had only recently bought at a public sale at Farmers Mills, was kicked by another horse. The horse's left hind leg was kicked off and the animal was shot to relieve its suffering.

M. O. Stover's public sale held on Tuesday near Woodward, which on account of inclement weather was postponed from the 13th, was largely attended. The stock sold high, while the implements sold considerably cheaper than at most sales held this spring. The sale, which included stock and machinery from two farms, amounted to \$10,000. Mr. Stover will move to Millheim.

Sold Mounted Deer Head—Fined.

H. W. Knepp, of Lewistown, is out \$90 net and a very fine mounted head of a deer as the result of a surprise Thursday, but he says he is comforted by being richer in knowledge. One of the articles sold at Knepp's public vendue the other day was the mounted head of a deer. It brought \$10, but hardly had the transaction been completed than some party, whose identity has not been made public, telephoned to J. J. Slatterback, a state game warden at Lewistown, and told him about the transaction. Slatterback had Knepp arraigned next day before Squire Gilbert for violating the law prohibiting the sale of any part of the body of a deer, whereupon Knepp was fined \$100. Knepp contends he was an innocent offender.
