MAY BE BONES OF HEROES

Uncertainty as to Human Relics Recently Found Near the Famous Alamo at San Antonio.

Recently workmen have unearthed in a portion of the Alamo grounds at San Antonio bones which may be those of the heroes of Texas whose bodies were cremated by the victorious forces under Santa Anna.

No effort was made to gather the bones nor to remove them to the enclosure of the Alamo. They were permitted to remain where they were found; and a garage is to be built over the spot, the ground where the discovery was made being outside the walls and a part of the property which has gone to commercial use.

The bones were found some 200 feet south of the wall of the Alamo; and the inquiry made has not fully developed whether they were those of the Texans or whether they were those of the Indians who were used to build the ancient mission and who formed the colony which the friars gathered about them to till their fields and to provide the food and the feed they required.—Houston Post.

FRISCH LOOKED UPON AS A SPEED WONDER

Expected to Take Laurels From Max Carey of Pirates.

Admirers of Fordham College Youth Say He Is Going to Be Fastest Man in National League in 1920 —Lobert Holds Record.

Who is the fastest man in the National league? Had that question been asked at the opening of the 1919 season the vote would have been unanimously for Max Carey of the Pirates, but now Carey's title is being questioned. Admirers of Frank Frisch, the Fordham college youth, who broke in with the New York Giants in 1918, say he is going to prove in 1920 that he has it on Carey in footwork. He made a record in college as a sprinter.

Until Max Carey sprang into prominence the fastest man in the National league was Hans Lobert. To this day Lobert holds a couple of National league records for speed. In a field day competition at Cincinnati on October 12, 1912, Lobert circled the bases in 13 4/5 seconds. On the same date Lobert tied for first place in a 100-yard dash. His rival was Vincent Campbell, then of the Pirates.

Campbell was another fast man who probably would be in the big leagues today if he cared for baseball. He was a big fellow who could hit, run

and field. He was a "five wire" with the Pirates, and took the hop to the Federal league. He went good with the Indianapolis club, and also with the Newark Reds. When peace came he decided to retire from the diamond for the automobile business. All efforts to have him reconsider were unavailing.

Advantages in Knowing Chinese.

As part of an elaborate program in spoken languages Columbia university is to teach Dutch, Japanese, Arabic, Armenian, Chinese, French, Danish, Norwegian, Icelandic, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, Spanish and Turkish. The importance of Chinese was recently emphasized at Columbia by Julien Arnold, American commercial attaché at Peking, who told an audience that from 500 to 1,000 Americans should be trained in the essentials of Chinese civilization in the next ten years. Tremendous trade potentialities lie in China, said Mr. Arnold.

Chinese Newspaper in France.

A Chinese weekly newspaper has been started in Paris by Daniel Fu for the benefit of the thousands of Chinese sent there to act as laborers during the war and who are now employed in reconstruction work, according to the far eastern information bureau. The paper is produced by a photographic process, the sheets having been hand-written, since it is impossible to get Chinese type in France. The paper sells at 2 cents a copy, and is said to be the first Chinese newspaper produced in France.

GRIDDLE CAKES and WAFFLES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

THERE is an art in making flapjack pancakes, griddle cakes or waffles, call them what you will. But it is an art very easily and quickly acquired if you follow the right recipes.

Here are some recipes for a variety of breakfast cakes that will make grandmother envious. The secret, of course, is Royal Baking Powder.

Royal Hot Griddle Cakes

2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1 1/2 cups milk
1 tablespoon shortening
Mix and sift dry ingredients; add milk and melted shortening; beat well. Bake on slightly greased hot griddle.

Griddle Cakes with Eggs

1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups milk
1 tablespoon shortening
Mix and sift dry ingredients; add beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening; mix well. Bake immediately on hot griddle.

Buckwheat Cakes

2 cups buckwheat flour
1 cup flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk or milk and water
1 tablespoon molasses
1 tablespoon shortening

Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

Waffles

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups milk
2 eggs
1 tablespoon melted shortening

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.
